#### Clerk-

Please add this to the public comments for 09/23/24 Planning Board Item 5A. for the 3100 Central Preschool called for review by Councilmember Spencer on behalf of concerned citizens.

### PROPOSED PROJECT

The proposed Project is a new and higher-intensity land-use Project in the named neighborhood that poses health and safety issues among others, and proposes changes to the exterior land and use patterns--among other things.

The applicant has provided additional information about use and changes to this Project for the upcoming meeting; but they must be considered merely as claims until those claims are evaluated in order to determine if they are sufficient for approval of the Project under the proper CEQA review process.

# **CITY'S PATTERN OF IMPROPER CEQA EXEMPTIONS**

The public and administrative record for this project CLEARLY shows that there are potential impacts for this Project, and therefore the City's CEQA determination(s) that any Categorical exemptions apply is (knowingly) fraudulent.

The public record shows the City has a consistent pattern of using fraudulent Categorical Exemptions to bypass proper public review, and this Project is just another example.

It is unlikely lower level staff are "going rogue" and, based on the public record, it is my opinion that Senior Staff--including the City Manager and City Attorney(s)---are either coercing or cajoling junior staff into breaking law--one that subjects staff to criminal penalties pursuant to CA PC115--which means that Staff are forced to lie to the public and filing fraudulent forms to government agencies, creating an extremely hostile work environment.

Indeed the prejudicial letter inappropriately included in this agenda packet from the City Manager in support of this Project is evidence of intimidation--not just of the employees, but to the public--and likely to influence the Planning Board's votes as well.

# IMPROPER CATEGORICAL EXEMPTION(S)

Neither of Mr Buckley's Exemptions apply. Therefore, the Planning Board should correct this error and require proper CEQA review.

# **CEQA Class 1 (Section 15301) Exemption:**

- Consists of... <u>minor alterations</u> of existing structures... <u>involving negligible or no</u>
   expansion of existing or former use---
- The key consideration is whether the project involves negligible or no expansion of use.
- Examples include previous permits for the property for" new doors and windows, electrical work, and ne roof and siding that matched existing.
- CEQA Section 15301

# CEQA Class 3(e) (Section 15303) Exemption:

- consists of new construction...where <u>only minor modifications are made in the exterior of</u> the structure.
- Examples of this exemption include but are not limited to: Accessory (appurtenant) structures including garages, carports, patios, swimming pools, and fences.
- Pursuant to Section 51300.2, to quality for 15303, there must be NO potential for: **(b)** Cumulative Impacts; or **(c)** Significant Effects; or **(f)** Historical Resources.
- CEOA Section 15303; Section 15300.2.

(note there is also an "amnesty" building permit to allow the rear rooms to be used for residential use).

### **NEED FOR PROPER CEQA EVALUATION**

The CEQA Exemption for this Project is easily shown to be defective FROM A DISTANCE by:

- (1) the Project materials themselves-- including the Project activities, description, and self-imposed conditions; which all provide sufficient substantial attempt to show how environmental impacts of the Project will mitigate them to less than significant.
- (2) the enormous amount of well-researched and referenced General Plan consistency evaluation by Appellants; and conditions under which a Class 1 or Class 3 Categorical Exemption applies.

As the Appellants eloquently showed in their Statement, not only does the Project fail the General Plan consistency analysis, but it will certainly cause numerous significant environmental impacts that were neither disclosed nor evaluated under the improper Administrative Use permit process.

Their Statement shows just how obvious it is that Mr Buckely (who has negligible CEQA background) improperly determined the Project was exempt from CEQA pursuant to both Class 1 and Class 3(e) exemptions-- it would be laughable if this abuse of power didnt have such far-reaching consequences. Additionally, the City does not have the required Section 15022 "Implementing Procedures" so any and all CEQA determinations are legally defective.

Note this comment is not about the merits of the project. It is about the <u>process</u>, because even a "good" project can be proposed in a "bad" location, as is the case with this one. And when the process is bypassed, negative impacts to the environment ensue.

## **PROJECT CANNOT BE APPROVED**

Accordingly, this Project cannot be approved by the Planning Board at this time, and cannot be reviewed until a correct CEQA review of the Project is completed and the proper public review process is followed and including whether or not the Project can reduce impacts to less than significant and whether or not it can can even proceed.

A proper CEQA process would include separately agendizing the CEQA determination (after the appropriate time given for public review), at which meeting the Planning Board shall independently evaluate the environmental review report wherein each Member shall vote individually on the sufficiency of the record to support the Determination, and provide their reasoning in front of the public prior to voting.

Only after the CEQA determination is approved can the Project be heard before the decision-making body. Additionally the Project application is not complete.

However, if this Board wrongly proceeds without further CEQA review---thereby risking yet another CEQA lawsuit-- then the Board should at least ensure that every assertion made in the Applicants statement is a condition of approval for use of the space---revocable upon the first violation of such.

In any case, in the discussion about this item, the Board should consider that the Applicant was approved in April for another 100-child facility on Blanding, less than a mile away, that has not even started to operate, which makes a total of 3 preschools operated by them in this City not including this permit. The Applicant also stated none of the other preschools are "Full" so maybe they should fully enroll those first, instead of applying for another site when the first 3 arent fully operational yet.

### **CONCLUSION**

The Planning Board should table this Item until further notice in order to comply with the law and in consideration hat the application is untimely and premature due to the other sites being not fully operational yet.

Clerk - Please add this comment to the Planning Board agenda item 5A.

The Planning Board must conduct an independent and thorough review de novo and must consider and re-consider <u>all</u> information presented including information that was and is in existence and erroneously excluded by the "Zoning Administrator" and also shall include review of the erroneous CEQA Determination and be reviewed "anew" pursuant to 30-1.2(b). (See AMC 30-25.5(c) RE: introduction of all pertinent material)

Given that one of the main arguments is that the Zoning Administrator followed legally-defective procedures, the Planning Board should request a legal briefing from the City's land use attorney Cara Silver or another City attorney and should also inform the public as to the proper CEQA and other legal procedures that were and/or should be followed as well.

- 1. **AMENDED PROJECT.** The Staff Report amends the use permit information down from 100 children to 50 children, as well as other newly-proposed and unsubstantiated use changes and "ingeneral" conclusions that have yet to be reviewed-- this new information materially changes the Project rendering the previous review invalid (which is also invalid for at least the reason that it was procedurally defective).
- 2. **EXISTING CONDITIONS.** The existing 2,600 square foot building was built in 1924 and hat was previously used as a church and day care for up to **12** children a number of years ago. This building is 100 years old and exterior alterations may require a Certificate of Approval from the Historical Advisory Board.
- 3. **DEFICIENT STAFF REPORT.** The staff report inadequately characterizes the issues submitted on Appeal and provides inadequate and legally-defective answers as well--and in any case cannot be considered exhaustive and the Planning Board should ensure they consider all the facts presented including licensing and zoning requirements and others.
- 4. **COMPLAINTS OF RECORD**. The Staff Report states "The applicant operates three other Small Size Big Minds facilities in Alameda that are well operated facilities with *no complaints of record*." Note a fourth was just granted a use permit from the "Zoning Administrator" in April 2024, as well. Online Reports for facilities go back 3-5 years, with 4 complaints and 2 citations on record.

**2450 Pan Am Way,** Facility #013423060 has 3 complaints and 2 citations (https://www.ccld.dss.ca.gov/carefacilitysearch/FacDetail/013423060/013423060)

**2001 Santa Clara Ave,** Facility #013423122, 013423106 (https://www.ccld.dss.ca.gov/carefacilitysearch/FacDetail/013423106)

**3300 Bridgeview Isle,** Facility #013418968 has 1 complaint (https://www.ccld.dss.ca.gov/carefacilitysearch/FacDetail/013418968)

(2694 Blanding)--use permit approved April 2024, not yet in operation.

5. **LICENSING REQUIREMENTS.** The Applicant's materials and accompanying staff report should be reviewed for consistency with licensing requirements before Project approval. Applicant should provide licensing requirements for staffing, use, and square footage and others that Project approval shall be contingent upon, including minimum outdoor safety measures etc that impact the exterior use and surrounding vicinity to be submitted prior to Project approval. The Application should be considered incomplete until receipt of all necessary information.

For example, the Summary Report Discussion states "The facility will employ two shifts, with a maximum of 6 employees on site at any given time." which I believe is insufficient staffing for the proposed amount of students and since the Project approval is based in part on traffic and parking impacts, the Board should make approval of that element based on accurate licensing requirements for the Project.

6. **CEQA.** The Project proposes physical changes to the site and surrounding vicinity and increased-intensity and changed land use in the low-density residential district and must be reviewed for potentially significant impacts, including NOISE, and including others described in the Appellants' statement and those admitted to by the Applicant and potentially others--admissions in the Staff Report are substantial evidence that there is potential for significant impacts and further, "in general" traffic statements are even an admission of potentially significant impacts, therefore this Project is not exempt from CEQA.

As stated previously, the CEQA Exemptions do not apply because Categorical Exemptions may be applied only if there is no potential for significant impacts to occur and in any case the named exemptions are not applicable to this Project (see my prior comment); alternatively and additionally, the City is not compliant with CEQA Section 15022 and does not have "CEQA implementing Procedures" which invalidates the Exemption because they cannot demonstrate they followed the proper procedures. Additionally, the CEQA determination should be separately and independently evaluated and voted upon by the Board citing substantial evidence to support their vote, which, due to lack of compliance with Section 15022, they will not be able to pprovide and therefore is invalid.

A Project-level environmental review is needed as shown by the Appellants' Statement that effectively qualifies as an Initial Study under CEQA.

7. **CONCLUSION.** This Project, as proposed, is infeasible and requires further review for potential environmental impacts and consistency with the zoning code and the general plan under the proper legal process. *Favoritism notwithstanding*.

Hello all,

I am a mom of a preschooler and a resident living directly across from 3100 Central Ave (the former church). I support the idea of having a preschool in this location, but I **do not support the** *scale* of this project nor the lack of thorough consideration of its impact on our residential community.

The decision to base the capacity of **50 kids (100 enrolled)** solely on indoor square footage disregards all other community-related factors:

# **Indoor Space**

CDSS requires 35 sqft/child, equating to ~50 kids capacity for this property. The plan is to maximize capacity by enrolling 50 kids **twice** a day, at 100 kids per day total.

# **Outdoor Space**

The small outdoor space does not meet CDSS requirements (75 sqft per child). As a result, 100 children will need to rotate outside in shifts, increasing noise impact as children will be outside at staggered intervals for the majority of the day.

### **Noise Impact**

The city considered noise impact for the applicant's properties at **Blanding** (PLN24-0067) and Pan Am Way (PLN18-0191), but noise was not

**considered for 3100 Central**, despite it being an R-1 property in a residential neighborhood with homes as close as 4 ft from the schoolyard. Directly adjacent to the property is another small schoolyard that already generates noise levels **over 90 db**, which is classified "unacceptable" according to city quidelines.

# **Neighborhood Fit**

There is an over-saturation of schools with 4 other schools within a 500 ft radius of the property. A preschool 1 block away has open availability, no waitlist, which raises questions about whether a preschool this size is needed in this neighborhood.

# Traffic & Safety

No study has been conducted to evaluate the impact of 100 children being dropped off and picked up daily in a neighborhood already strained by nearby schools.

# **Street Parking**

Street parking is packed during drop-off and pick-up times due to nearby school drop-offs at Saint Philip Neri. See record of ~100 parent signatures due to parking difficulty.

# **Parking Lot**

No parking lot. This is the only one of the five properties owned by Small Size Big Minds that lacks a dedicated parking lot.

The Planning Department has made it clear they want this preschool approval to go through, both verbally and as evident in their publicly stated support, such as "Staff has been actively supporting SSBM as they seek to expand in Alameda" and "staff is working with the Tenant in an effort to find an alternative long-term location" (see attached).

This strong level of support, combined with the disregard for the community concerns outlined above, raises serious questions about whether the voices and interests of Alameda residents are being fairly considered in this process.

As a mom of a preschooler, I find it deeply uncomfortable to speak out against the establishment of a new preschool. While I fully support the need for quality preschool education, a smaller enrollment capacity would better serve both the preschool and the surrounding residential area.

I am disheartened by the lack of thoughtful consideration in this project and appreciate the Planning Board's review of the plans.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Small Size Big Mind (SSBM) was established in 2006 and is a year round infant care and preschool serving children from eight weeks to five years old located on the east end of the City of Alameda. Due to extensive waiting lists of over 80 families, SSBM has been working with the City to find an expansion site for over a year and has expressed great interest in expanding on the West End, including at Alameda Point. City staff has been actively supporting SSBM as they seek to expand in Alameda and meet the growing demand for their preschool. Building 35 located in the first development phase of the Main Street Neighborhood at Alameda Point that is currently being marketed for a market rate development is the only near-term site City staff has been able to find as an interim site for expansion until SSBM finds a more permanent location. More detail on the other potential sites is provide below.

#### **DISCUSSION**

Building 35 provides an appropriate classroom and fenced yard space. The tenant will need to provide an accessible entrance/exit and bring the building up to a preschool standard. To offset the investment the tenant is making in the building, the lease provides a capital repair credit in the amount of \$60,000 which may be credited against rent payments during months 1 through 15 of the proposed term of the lease. Monthly base rent is set at \$4,141 for months 1 through 12 and \$4,266 for months 13 through 24. If SSBM continues for the one-year option term, rent will increase to \$4,394.

Staff expects that the first phase of the development in the Main Street Neighborhood to start in three years which makes Building 35 only an **interim** expansion site for the school until a permanent location is secured at an alternative location. Because of the importance of not interfering with the timeline associated with the first phase of the Main Street Neighborhood development, staff was not willing to advance this lease until SSBM could demonstrate credible leads on alternative locations to relocate the school. SSBM has demonstrated to City staff that they have credible alternatives for a permanent expansion of the school by year three, which include:

- Renovating and purchasing the chapel building at Alameda Point;
- Becoming a subtenant in one of the multi-tenanted buildings being developed in the adaptive reuse area (SSBM currently has an agreement of terms with one); and
- Continuing evaluation of already identified potential land sites for portable development of the school facility.

SSBM staff understands that Building 35 is for no more than three years due to impending new development and they have indicated a strong commitment to simultaneously searching for a new permanent location. Therefore, staff has agreed to advance the interim plan for City Council consideration. The lease includes an aggressive holdover rent of 200% to ensure SSBM continues to look for an alterative permanent location. Staff and the broker also will continue to work to find an alternate site for SSBM at Alameda Pont, as they have expressed enthusiasm for providing daycare/preschool services for not only serving the families on their waitlist, but also the new families moving into Alameda Point.

### **FINANCIAL IMPACT**

The monies from the leases will be deposited into the Base Reuse Lease Revenue Fund (Fund 858) and are limited to uses permitted under the Economic Development Conveyance Memorandum of Agreement with the United States Navy (Navy).

#### MUNICIPAL CODE/POLICY DOCUMENT CROSS REFERENCE

This action does not affect the Alameda Municipal Code.

### **ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW**

In accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), this project is Categorically Exempt under the CEQA Guidelines Section 15301(c) - Existing Facilities.

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

Small Size Big Minds, a California corporation (Tenant), is a tenant of the City of Alameda (City) and occupies Building 35 at 2450 Pan Am Way (Premises), at Alameda Point. Tenant wishes to extend the term of the Lease (as defined below) for the Premises. The Third Amendment to the Lease reflects a twelve-month extension with monthly rent of \$4,827, plus a twelve-month extension option with monthly rent of \$5,005. Because the Premises is adjacent to the RESHAP portion of the West Midway project, the extension term has been kept intentionally short in recognition of the fact that the Tenant would be in the midst of a very active construction site once the West Midway project commences construction, and this is not an ideal situation for a pre-school. Additionally, staff is working with the Tenant in an effort to find an alternative long-term location that best fits its business needs.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The City and Tenant entered into the Lease Agreement dated September 10, 2018, as amended by a First Amendment to Lease Agreement dated July 16, 2020, and a Second Amendment to Lease Agreement dated October 21, 2021 (collectively, the Lease), for the Premises consisting of approximately 2,764 square feet of rentable space in Building 35 and an underlying parcel that includes 16,552 square feet. The expiration date of the Lease is August 31, 2023.

#### DISCUSSION

In the Third Amendment, the City and Tenant have agreed to extend the Lease term for a period of twelve months for monthly rent of \$4,827, plus an extension term for an additional twelve months for monthly rent of \$5,005.

The extension term is short in recognition of the fact that the Tenant is adjacent to an active construction site once the West Midway project commences construction, which is not ideal for a pre-school. Staff will work with the Tenant to identify an alternative long-term location, if feasible. Tenant is currently undertaking due diligence on a potential alternative site and if this location turns out to be a viable option for the Tenant, then staff will later return to City Council to seek direction on this separate matter.

#### **ALTERNATIVES**

- Approve the Third Amendment to the Lease for Building 35 extending the term for twelve months, plus an extension option for an additional twelve
  months.
- Do not approve the Third Amendment to the Lease for Building 35, which will require the Tenant to relocate the pre-school before August 31, 2023.
- Direct staff to negotiate a different extension term.

#### **FINANCIAL IMPACT**

Lease revenue will be deposited in the Alameda Point/Base Reuse Fund (290) and used for purposes described in the Economic Development Conveyance Agreement. Under the proposed Third Amendment to the Lease for Building 35, the monthly rent would increase from \$4,525 to \$4,827, or from \$54,300 to \$57,924 annually.




I hope this message finds you well. I am writing to express my ongoing concerns regarding the proposed preschool project at 3100 Central Avenue. Upon reviewing the applicant's four other preschool locations on Alameda Island, the differences between this new proposal and their existing facilities are stark.

I have compiled a comparison table to highlight how the 3100 Central project stands out as a "worst-case scenario" in terms of lot size, zoning, parking, the number of students, and the fact that it will be offering two types of services, not just one

- Lot Size: The lot size for 3100 Central Avenue is only 5,855 sqft, significantly smaller than the applicant's other properties, which range from 17,024 to 39,772 sqft.
- Parking: Unlike their other preschools, which provide between 6 and 12 parking spaces, this proposal includes no parking spaces. This is particularly concerning given the already limited parking and traffic congestion in the neighborhood.
- Programs Officed IT is over that the goal of dening 100 students and officing both precision and atherance services is well-intentioned and admirable. We all want to see more availability of services like these in our community, and it's wonderful that the applicant is looking to provide these opportunities. However, within a 500 ft radius, our neighborhood already-hosts 3 schools—1 precchool, a precision 5-bit grades exhold, 1 summer camp, and 2 languages exhold is serviced, and 1 languages exhold is serviced, and 1 languages exhold is serviced, and language exhold is serviced. The combination of high student numbers, dual services, and lack of adequate parking make it a poor for for the 100 years.





I am a parent of two girls (4 and 9), an Alameda resident and registered, reliable voter and I strongly support the afterschool and preschool programs at 3100 Central Avenue as proposed by Malyka Chop and Small Size Big Mind.

Alameda families like me and many others are in desperate need of more high quality after care and preschool options. More than 115,000 Alameda County children lack access to formal childcare and early education. In Alameda proper there are so many impacted daycare and afterschool programs, I myself have been rejected from several for my older daughter due to long waitlists and space limitations. Many programs like Alameda Island Kids limit the number of pre-k/kindergartners they take, making it even harder to find care for 4 and 5 year olds.

Both my daughters have attended Small Size Big Mind campuses so I have had nearly a decade of experience with the school. From experience I can say that the Small Size Big Mind community is respectful of its neighbors and that drop off and pick of students is minimally impactful as it is staggered so it does not cause undue burden or traffic congestion. In addition, many parents and Small Size Big Mind staff opt to walk or ride bikes, further reducing traffic issues. I am following up to my first email with a second to continue my support of the proposed Small Size Big Mind After Care Program/Preschool at 3100 Central Ave.

It is so disheartening to see a community come together and use its powers to limit the family environment and childcare options that Alameda is known for and desperately needs.

If childcare is continually on the chopping block with city council because some neighbors don't like the sound of children playing, or fences, or competing preschools are allowed to monopolize the area, families will stop coming to Alameda. If SSBM will follow all of the noise ordinance rules, be thoughtful about the design of the space, and open their doors to all kinds of families then there is no reason they should be denied after the first approval.

Every daycare and childcare option in Alameda has a waitlist and we are often speaking with parents who are dumbfounded by the continued lack of childcare options on the island. Small Size Big Mind and other high-quality programs have waitlists of 12-36 months.

Additionally, after-care programs are almost non-existent. SSBM is looking to help the community and working parents by creating a safe, neighborhood-centric space for school-aged children and families to send their kids after school, while parents are still at work- we should be celebrating this option!

I was present for the first community hearing where the school was approved and feel that all concerns were thoroughly addressed. The owners have updated the design, program, schedule, and parking and drop off procedures to address concerns of the neighbors effectively to fit in as a positive addition to the area and will add public parking by removing a driveway and increasing the public curb.

The purpose of this location is also to provide an option that is walking distance to both elementary schools in the area, Otis and Edison for after care, and close to a public park for field trips and outings, as well as walking distance to where many of the families who need care live. Which means, the intention is to have very few families and staff actually drive. Most families will be able to walk and bike, eliminating any car congestion concerns.

Most importantly, I have been visiting 3100 Central Ave. block area and building over the past few weeks at all different times of day to try and observe the parking and school conflict issues that some of the neighbors raised as a genuine attempt to see their perspective...

I have been by between 7am-8:30am, 3:30pm, 4:30pm. etc and there is almost not a single car moving in that area at any time. There is always ample parking, I have seen no overlap with Rising Star or Philip Neri, based on where each school does the majority of their kid pick-ups and drop-offs. This block and street seem to have plenty of space, parking availability, and no other large group conflict regarding the higher "trafficked" times of the school day.

We can't limit community development and childcare options just because a louder school is afraid of competition and some neighbors don't want anyone driving on their street.

I believe it is in the City Council's best interest to uphold the approval and help Alameda get the child care it needs, and continue to support the family-friendly community we know and love.

My name is Trista Taylor and I am writing in support of the proposed Small Size Big Mind After Care Program/Preschool at 3100 Central Ave, on behalf of our family.

We currently have two children enrolled at the SSBM Santa Clara campus and have been involved in the community there for almost 2 years now.

In our experience with the Santa Clara campus, parking, fencing, and noise do not feel like big concerns if another school was to be added to the community.

Our family bikes and walks to school as much as possible, probably only driving for pick-up and drop-off about 60% of the time. We also regularly see many other families doing pick-up and drop-off by bike or walking (almost to the point that we might need bike parking and less car parking!). Because SSBM has several locations around the island it feels like most families choose one that is within walking or biking distance so they can avoid driving.

On the occasions where we are using a car, we have never had any issues getting a spot in the designated parking lot. Around the side of the school, where some of the teachers park and there is drop-off overflow, I also regularly see plenty of spare spots. And this campus shares a lot of drop-off timing with Love Elementary and I have never seen an issue (I actually sometimes see Love parents using the SSBM parking lot).

I also take public transportation quite regularly (the O and the 51A conveniently dropoff right next to the school) and also know that many of the SSBM school staff also take the bus and are not parking cars. I see them on the bus and at the bus stop!

We are very involved in the local parenting community in Alameda and all we hear is how difficult child care is to find in Alameda. SSBM and many others consistently have a waitlist with frustrated parents that in such a family-centric community in Alameda it's almost mind-blowing how difficult it is to find childcare. The common story is that daycares and pre-schools don't even return your calls or emails when you're inquiring because the demand is so high they don't need to.

The idea of opening up additional affordable child-care options in Alameda should be the headline here- the community desperately needs it! Especially with the California TK program getting a bit of an update and it being available to more kids in theory over the next few years, still opens a big need for families- TK at the public schools is only a half-day. After-care is also in high demand and may become even more-so as the TK program evolves.

SSBM and Malyka always do a beautiful and thoughtful job with their school design. Every classroom is designed and hand crafted with love. I suspect that any concerns about the "fence" on Central can be handled with a creative approach, that seems like a red-herring concern.

I hope to join the meeting at 2pm. Our family would enthusiastically welcome the additional preschool to our neighborhood and think it would be great to bring some additional business over to the East End.

I am following up to my first email with a second to continue my support of the proposed Small Size Big Mind After Care Program/Preschool at 3100 Central Ave.

It is so disheartening to see a community come together and use its powers to limit the family environment and childcare options that Alameda is known for and desperately needs.

If childcare is continually on the chopping block with city council because some neighbors don't like the sound of children playing, or fences, or competing preschools are allowed to monopolize the area, families will stop coming to Alameda.

If SSBM will follow all of the noise ordinance rules, be thoughtful about the design of the space, and open their doors to all kinds of families then there is no reason they should be denied after the first approval.

Every daycare and childcare option in Alameda has a waitlist and we are often speaking with parents who are dumbfounded by the continued lack of childcare options on the island. Small Size Big Mind and other high-quality programs have waitlists of 12-36 months.

Additionally, after-care programs are almost non-existent. SSBM is looking to help the community and working parents by creating a safe, neighborhood-centric space for school-aged children and families to send their kids after school, while parents are still at work- we should be celebrating this option!

I was present for the first community hearing where the school was approved and feel that all concerns were thoroughly addressed. The owners have updated the design, program, schedule, and parking and drop off procedures to address concerns of the neighbors effectively to fit in as a positive addition to the area and will add public parking by removing a driveway and increasing the public curb.

The purpose of this location is also to provide an option that is walking distance to both elementary schools in the area, Otis and Edison for after care, and close to a public park for field trips and outings, as well as walking distance to where many of the families who need care live. Which means, the intention is to have very few families and staff actually drive. Most families will be able to walk and bike, eliminating any car congestion concerns.

**Most importantly, I have been visiting 3100 Central Ave. block** area and building over the past few weeks at all different times of day to try and observe the parking and school conflict issues that some of the neighbors raised as a genuine attempt to see their perspective...

I have been by between 7am-8:30am, 3:30pm, 4:30pm. etc and there is almost not a single car moving in that area at any time. There is always ample parking, I have seen no overlap with Rising Star or Philip Neri, based on where each school does the majority of their kid pick-ups and drop-offs. This block and street seem to have plenty of space, parking availability, and no other large group conflict regarding the higher "trafficked" times of the school day.

We can't limit community development and childcare options just because a louder school is afraid of competition and some neighbors don't want anyone driving on their street.

I believe it is in the City Council's best interest to uphold the approval and help Alameda get the child care it needs, and continue to support the family-friendly community we know and love.

Hi Henry,

My name is Trista Taylor and I am writing in support of the proposed Small Size Big Mind After Care Program/Preschool at 3100 Central Ave, on behalf of our family.

We currently have two children enrolled at the SSBM Santa Clara campus and have been involved in the community there for almost 2 years now.

In our experience with the Santa Clara campus, parking, fencing, and noise do not feel like big concerns if another school was to be added to the community.

Our family bikes and walks to school as much as possible, probably only driving for pick-up and drop-off about 60% of the time. We also regularly see many other families doing pick-up and drop-off by bike or walking (almost to the point that we might need bike parking and less car parking!). Because SSBM has several locations around the island it feels like most families choose one that is within walking or biking distance so they can avoid driving.

On the occasions where we are using a car, we have never had any issues getting a spot in the designated parking lot. Around the side of the school, where some of the teachers park and there is drop-off overflow, I also regularly see plenty of spare spots. And this campus shares a lot of drop-off timing with Love Elementary and I have never seen an issue (I actually sometimes see Love parents using the SSBM parking lot).

I also take public transportation quite regularly (the O and the 51A conveniently drop-off right next to the school) and also know that many of the SSBM school staff also take the bus and are not parking cars. I see them on the bus and at the bus stop!

We are very involved in the local parenting community in Alameda and all we hear is how difficult child care is to find in Alameda. SSBM and many others consistently have a waitlist with frustrated parents that in such a family-centric community in Alameda it's almost mind-blowing how difficult it is to find childcare. The common story is that daycares and pre-schools don't even return your calls or emails when you're inquiring because the demand is so high they don't need to.

The idea of opening up additional affordable child-care options in Alameda should be the headline here- the community desperately needs it! Especially with the California TK program getting a bit of an update and it being available to more kids in theory over the next few years, still opens a big need for families- TK at the public schools is only a half-day. After-care is also in high demand and may become even more-so as the TK program evolves.

SSBM and Malyka always do a beautiful and thoughtful job with their school design. Every classroom is designed and hand crafted with love. I suspect that any concerns about the "fence" on Central can be handled with a creative approach, that seems like a red-herring concern.

I hope to join the meeting at 2pm. Our family would enthusiastically welcome the additional preschool to our neighborhood and think it would be great to bring some additional business over to the East End.

# Dear Planning Board and City Council,

It is my understanding that certain groups are attempting to convince the city to block the approval and opening of a new preschool at 3100 Central Avenue. I would first like to point out that this is obviously a private matter and if the business in question has met the needs and requirements of the city, county, and state then it is not the business of a bunch of random weirdos (or myself for that matter) whether the city approves them or not. Permitting should all be based on the same set of standards that are set in advance and apply to all equally.

The primary argument that I hear from these groups is of concern for parking. I bike by the proposed location on a daily basis and there is ample parking. Parking is not a concern for this type of business. Parents arrive briefly to drop off and pick up their children and are rarely there for more than a few minutes. Most parents at the daycare my son attends bike or walk their children. The greater the density of child care in the city of Alameda, the more parents will be able to walk or bike, and the less concern parking will be across the city.

The site at 3100 Central is a perfect location for a much-needed preschool/aftercare program in Alameda. As you may know, wait lists for high quality childcare in Alameda are insanely long, and there are just not enough affordable options run by trusted educator-caregivers who have been part of this community for years. As a solo mom of a 2-year-old who needs to work full-time, childcare is essential to my livelihood and I dread the scramble for after-school care that I know is ahead of us.

I understand there is a concern about parking in the neighborhood, but drop-off/pick-ups at a program like this are spread out over several hours. #### Dear Council Members and other City Stakeholders--

I am writing in support of Small Size Big Mind moving into the former church building at 3100 Central Avenue and providing preschool and aftercare services. This business will fill a vital need in an environment where, post-pandemic, many childcare businesses have closed.

While my two children are now older and no longer need these services, I remember very well the struggle to find quality, affordable care. At times it seemed like a Herculean task, requiring a lot of time, energy, and stress. As a nonprofit worker married to a teacher, we made too much to qualify for any subsidy, but less than \$100k per year, so that the monthly costs were a huge chunk of our budget--at times, 1/3 of our monthly after-tax wages were swallowed by the expense. I have heard horror stories from my neighbors who currently have young children about their struggle to find childcare in Alameda. It shouldn't be this way.

My family has lived in Alameda for 20 years, first on the East end and now on the West. I was thrilled when my younger brother and his wife moved here 10 years ago and started their family, just blocks away from mine. These young families are the lifeblood of Alameda. These children are Alameda's future workers and taxpayers. Whenever I hear another account of how hard it is to find childcare in our community, it breaks my heart and I thank my lucky stars that my own children are now 15 and 21, and I no longer have to deal with this issue.

Please do not let a handful of neighbors worried about street parking--and, I'm familiar with that neighborhood, so I know that 90%+ of these people have off-street driveways, some that fit 2 or 3 vehicles!--derail a much-needed service to the community from utilizing the space.

As a resident and parent in Alameda I strongly support approving a preschool and afterschool program at 3100 Central Avenue as proposed by Malyka Chop and Small Size Big Mind.

Alameda is known to be a family-friendly island, but there are too few pre/after school programs given the number of families that live here. Being a parent is difficult as it is, especially in the Bay Area, where everything seems to cost an arm and a leg, and there is a waitlist 5 miles long to get into good schools/daycares.

If your goal is to attract the right type of people to the island, and not just renters who will come and go and not be invested in improving our communities, it is important to find solutions for families who will be willing to keep roots here. Otherwise, we will either have to seek solutions outside of the island (i.e., in Oakland) which is not sustainable, or we will have to move out of the area.

I understand that the main opposition to building this school is traffic/noise. I feel that the amount of disruption to the local neighborhood is overblown. There are a set number of hours where maybe there will be some additional traffic, but not all parents will be coming and going at the same time, like would be the case for a grade school, so it is likely not to be as disruptive as the neighbors may be concerned about. As to noise -- while there may be some additional noise from kids playing outside as is the case for any community with a school, but there will be at max 50 children in the program, and much of their day will be spent indoors as well. Also, more daycare programs/schools result in safer communities, as parents will always advocate for and be invested in safety around the area where their kids are being cared for.

Thank you so much for considering this proposal, and for the future of Alameda, I sincerely hope you do not block this from moving forward.

#### Dear Mr. Dong:

I live close to 3100 Central Avenue in that I am able to see the facility from the front windows in my home. As a psychologist, I understand the need for safe, quality childcare programs. As a resident, I am very concerned about an increase in noise and traffic safety risks, in addition to an oversaturation of childcare given the proposed size of the facility. My primary concerns involve the proposed number of children, expansion of outdoor fenced play areas, and the vague limitations set regarding program numbers, hours, and Summer/after hours events.

I am particularly uneasy about the extension of outdoor play space. Even if outdoor play is limited to 18 children at a time, there are multiple times of day during which play will occur. According to social media posts, there are even plans to expand to Summer camps and after hours gatherings. This facility has been described as a large church, which it is not. The previous child care program had 12 kids, which is dramatically different from the proposed 100 kids, even in two shifts. As someone who intermittently needs to work from home, the increase in noise will have a very disruptive effect. Although I do appreciate the new proposal to limit outdoor play to 18 kids and to leave the front unfenced, I still believe that the increase in noise will be substantial with the addition of fenced play areas on the sides. The church that operated in this location was quiet throughout the week, with services on Sunday only. The proposed childcare center would dramatically change the frequency of activity.

In addition to outdoor play time, the early drop-off hours will result in noise from people and from car doors slamming. Despite the efforts to hire local staff and the hope that families will walk to the facility, there will certainly be many families driving on their way to work, etc.

There has been an increase in safety concerns when crossing Central in recent years. I have witnessed accidents and close-calls from cross traffic being unable to see speeding cars. Many drivers speed to and from High Street and rarely stop for pedestrians in the crosswalk. There are also parking concerns. Although I use a driveway, neighbors directly on the block of the site do not have driveways. On multiple blocks, including my own, we have lost parking spaces due to red curb paint

and street cleaning.

Finally, I am concerned about the process for initial approval of this project. We were not given much notice so the increase in size did not even sink in for some of us in the neighborhood until after the initial meeting. Although childcare is important, so is a balanced neighborhood. Phillip Neri Catholic School and a Montessori school are already close to the site.

In order to feel more comfortable with this project, I would like to see a significant decrease in the number of children permitted, limiting outdoor space to the rear where it is now, and clarification regarding whether the owners will have free reign to offer services throughout the Summer and after hours. Although there might be a wait-list for this particular facility, my understanding is that other childcare programs are unfilled. This program is already purchasing a larger site so why not help other facilities in the community, rather than allowing one program to have a monopoly?

Thank you for reading my email and I hope you will protect the wishes of the direct community by placing additional limits on the size and scope of this project.



As a parent, voter, and homeowner in Alameda's Fernside neighborhood – and as one of many neighbors in need of more afterschool options – I strongly support the approval of the new preschool and afterschool program at 3100 Central Avenue, proposed by Malyka Chop and Small Size Big Mind.

Alameda faces a significant shortfall in afterschool programs. With waitlists stretching from 12 to 36 months for Small Size Big Mind's existing facilities and other reputable childcare programs, families struggle to find reliable, accessible care. Both of my children have gone to SSBM, my daughter from age 3-5 and my son is currently enrolled there in infant care. We have found SSBM to be very respectful neighbors who organize drop off and pick up in thoughtful ways that do not overwhelm the local community. The times are stretched out over 2-2.5 hours so not everyone arrives or departs at once. SSBM is mindful of the need to avoid traffic, parking, and noise issues and will increase public parking at the new facility as well as designating drop off and pick up areas. They have operated curbside drop off and pick up during the pandemic and can do so again at the new site if needed.

There is a long waitlist of families hoping to access afterschool and preschool near 3100 Central and in Alameda more generally. I had a very difficult time finding a spot for my daughter back in 2021 and my son in 2023. The last thing we need is STOP more options from being available. Many SSBM families commute to school by walking or biking. Employees mostly live in Alameda and also take public transit to get to work in many cases.

The school is very conscientious of meeting all regulations for city and state licensing. They will use the facility appropriately for its size, provide appropriate fencing, and keep the property and landscaping in good repair. This facility was previously a preschool so there should really not be an issue with another preschool moving in.

Dear Planning Board and City Council,

As an Alameda resident and parent, I wholeheartedly support approving the preschool and afterschool program at 3100 Central Avenue, proposed by Malyka Chop and Small Size Big Mind.

Quality childcare is extremely limited, with programs like Small Size Big Mind having waitlists of 12-36 months. According to Alameda County, about 79% of children, with working parents, lack access to licensed child care and early education. Clearly the demand far exceeds the available licensed spaces for children. To ignore this, is to ignore our children.

At a larger scale, the State of California is facing a critical shortage of early care and education, with many areas labeled as childcare deserts. The pandemic exacerbated this gap, leading to the closure of numerous childcare facilities statewide. In response, the Legislature enacted the Child Care and Development Infrastructure Grant Program (Welfare and Institutions Code section 10310) on July 23, 2021, to expand access and mitigate these closures.

If you were to vote "no" to SSBMs location request, it would directly contradict the state's efforts to increase childcare availability, support working parents, and stimulate the local economy.

In regards to our Alameda community, the proposed location is ideal, within walking distance of Otis and Edison elementary schools, close to parks, and near many family homes. Its accessibility supports a walkable, bike-friendly community which is a primary goal of Alameda's Strategic 2023-2026 Plan.

With regards to our personal experience, Small Size Big Mind has consistently been

respectful of neighbors, effectively managing parking, congestion, and noise. The owners have already respectfully addressed community concerns to the new location by updating the design, schedule, and parking plan. The impact will be minimal, as the facility will serve fewer children (max 50) than the previously approved religious assembly (up to 125 people).

The benefits to our Alameda community and families far outweigh the purported "impacts," which, in my view, are being significantly overstated by some neighbors. I encourage everyone to critically examine the claims being made and seek concrete evidence of these "impacts" rather than relying on exaggerations and hearsay.

Dear Planning Commissioners,

My name is Matthew Thanablan. I live five doors down from the proposed use.

I understand the need for all neighborhoods to have their fair share of uses identified as needed in the general plan. I support a childcare use at this location, and am grateful that staff have revised the conditions associated with the use permit from what they presented originally, but I am surprised at the increased intensity of use proposed without third party impact analysis.

Permit to mitigate the new and significantly more intense use being proposed (while a 12-child preschool was operating in the site until recently, none of the previous religious use permits staff have referenced a childcare use other than Sunday school.) Not only has childcare not been an evaluated and approved use of the site before (based on the previous use permits referenced), but the number of students currently allowed in the drafted conditions of approval (50 at a time up to twice daily) would mean a significantly more intense use than the childcare for 12 that previously operated there - all the more reason to tie the conditions of approval to objective third-party analysis. It is not the job of the state childcare licensing entity to evaluate noise and traffic mitigation - it is the City's.

Noise is the most obvious conflict with meeting the City's Use Permit standards of being operationally harmonious with surrounding uses. City code 4-10.4 describes the acceptable outdoor noise level to be 75 decibels. Twelve preschool aged children playing at this location has been recorded to be 92 decibels, which is already not operationally harmonious with residential uses less than five feet away. The Commission should revise the condition related to the maximum number of children allowed to play outdoors at any one time from 18 (150% of the last childcare use at the property) to 14 (117% of the last childcare use at the

**property**- this would still be a noise level that would often exceed what the City allows per code, but is consistent with what is allowed for a large family daycare use, appropriate for a single family home sized building and lot.) This is especially important since the proposed outdoor space is immediately adjacent to the outdoor playspace for St. Philip Neri (producing its own decibels) and because the number of hours this use would be permitted to operate is 55 hours per week (compared to 12 hours per week approved under the religious assembly use staff referenced.)

I am also concerned about the 200 additional trips daily on a High Injury Corridor: Unless the total number of students allowed daily is revised, there could be up to a total of 200 new pickup/dropoff events every day (50 daycare dropoffs in the morning, 50 pickups later, 50 dropoffs for afterschool care in the afternoon followed by 50 pickups in the early evening) half of which would be during peak hours (which doesn't account for the 20 proposed staff, which is 10x as many staff than worked at the former preschool.) Whether those events are pedestrians, bicycle, or vehicle trips, and whether they are offset by reduced VMT by locating a third preschool in a three-block radius, typically a third party traffic analysis would be performed to confirm compatibility with CEQA exemption-this should be done and the total number of students allowed daily revised in the conditions accordingly if needed.

I am writing to express my concerns about the potential sale of the church property at 3100 Central to a large preschool. The preschool would accommodate 100 students and 20 staff members, with daily drop-offs and pickups. I understand the importance of early childhood education, but I am deeply concerned about the impact this will have on traffic and safety in our neighborhood.

As a resident of the neighborhood and parent of two young children who attend St. Philip Neri School, located around the corner from the proposed preschool site, I have witnessed firsthand the challenges we already face in managing traffic and ensuring the safety of all in the area. With approximately 250 students, our school has implemented many safety measures, such as student patrols and staff actively managing drop-off zones to maintain safety.

Dear Alameda City Council and Planning Department –

I am writing as a citizen of Alameda, and as a Plaintiff's side personal injury attorney, to appeal the Use Permit that has been approved related to the property located at 3100 Central Avenue, Alameda.

The property located at 3100 Central Avenue is poorly suited for the size of preschool and day care center ("SSBM") that is planned to open at that location. The neighborhood surrounding 3100 Central Avenue has limited street parking spots available for residents as it is. Additionally, one other large school and church – St. Philip Neri – already occupies a more than one block area just feet from 3100 Central Avenue. St. Philip Neri is attended by an estimated 325 students. The traffic in the blocks surrounding the school, which includes 3100 Central Avenue, is already incredibly congested. At drop-off time (approximately 7:40 a.m. to 8:10 a.m.) and pick-up time (approximately 3:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m.), available parking is nearly non-existent.

The neighborhood surrounding 3100 Central Avenue does not have the appropriate infrastructure to support the number of people (100 students, 20 staff members, and 75-100 parents of students) who will visit the proposed SSBM center on a daily basis (twice daily for the parents). Opening up a preschool and day care center that will host approximately 100 students and 20 staff members will mean an additional approximately 75-100 vehicles of traffic (potentially more) in the area at the same general times as the existing drop-off and pick-up times for St. Philip Neri. There are simply not enough parking spaces for all of these additional cars. Parents of children enrolled at St. Philip Neri and SSBMs will be forced to park blocks away from the schools and navigate through congested traffic with their children in tow in order to drop off and pick up their children from their respective schools. Importantly, the resident neighbors of St. Philip Neri and SSBM who arrive home during the rush-hour times will be forced to park their cars blocks from their homes because they will be unable to find parking directly in front of, or even nearby, their homes. Alternatively, residents will be required to circle the block several times waiting for a parking spot to open up, which will create even more traffic and risk to the children who are attempting to cross the neighborhood streets.

The increase in traffic and risk of illegal parking will create an undue safety hazard for all children in the area, including children walking to/from Otis and Edison Schools, and those riding their bikes down Central towards Lincoln Middle School and Alameda High School.

The increase in traffic on the neighborhood streets surrounding St. Philip Neri and the proposed SSBM school will cause cars to back up onto Central Avenue and High Street as other vehicles attempt to navigate through the narrow neighborhood streets. Because of the limited street parking spots available, drivers will resort to double parking, making the traffic congestion worse and increasing the risk to children walking in the area as they maneuver through doubly parked cars. Residents will have their driveways blocked by parents who are "just going to be gone for a minute" while they drop off or pick up their children. Cars will park in red zones near corners, marked as such to ensure drivers have a clear line of sight to oncoming traffic and pedestrians crossing the roadway. With cars parked in red zones (which is certain to occur with no ability to increase the amount of available parking in the area), all children and bicyclists in the area will be at increased risk for being hit by cars that are passing illegally parked cars.

The City cannot permit the preschool and daycare center to open without first developing a plan for traffic flow and parking. Unfortunately, there is no plan that will accommodate the sheer number of people who will visit the proposed SSBM center on a daily basis. There are only so many street parking spots. There is no way to increase the number of parking spots available on the surrounding streets. It is also not an option to provide the new preschool and daycare center with dedicated parking spots, as doing so would take parking spots away from neighboring residents. Additionally, there is no traffic plan that will reasonably accommodate the existing St. Philip Neri traffic and the significant increased traffic which will result from an additional 75-100 (or more) vehicles in the exceptionally small area during both the morning and evening rush hours.

If the City moves forward with the approval of the preschool and daycare center, they do so with full knowledge that they are compromising the safety of the neighboring residents and the students at St. Philip Neri, as well as all pedestrians and bicyclist who travel in the area during the morning and afternoon rush hours. The City has been put on notice. The City needs to show that a comprehensive traffic and safety study has been conducted which establishes that the increase in traffic will not cause a significant risk to human safety. Without such a finding, by permitting a preschool and daycare school of this size to open at this location, the City is knowingly creating an unreasonable risk of harm, and liability for such harm will fall on the City's shoulders and conscious.

For all of the foregoing reason, I respectfully urge the City to withdraw its approval of the Use Permit for the proposed SSBMs school at 3100 Central Avenue.

Dear City of Alameda,

I hope this message finds you well. I am writing to formally express several important concerns regarding the proposed preschool project at 3100 Central Avenue. While we recognize the value of early childhood education, we believe the project requires further review to ensure compliance with safety, environmental, and zoning regulations, particularly in a residential neighborhood like ours.

#### 1. Toilets and Sanitation Facilities

- Child-to-toilet ratio: One toilet and one sink are required for every 15 children.
- o For 50 children: The facility must provide at least four toilets and four sinks.
- Staff toilets: Separate facilities are required for staff, with a minimum of two toilets recommended for 20 staff members.
- ADA compliance: At least one ADA-compliant restroom is required for accessibility.
- Concern: The current plans lack adequate detail regarding these necessary bathroom facilities. Inadequate facilities would risk non-compliance with state regulations and compromise the well-being of both children and staff.

#### 2. Trash Storage and Pickup

- Volume of visitors: With 120 daily visitors (50 children per session, plus 20 staff members), the need for a proper trash management plan is crucial.
- Concern: The plans do not account for trash storage or pickup for this volume of people. Clarification is needed on how waste will be managed to avoid issues with sanitation, odors, and potential vermin problems.

#### 3. Missing Vegetation

- Existing landscaping: There are 10 large bushes along Fountain Street that are not included in the project plans.
- Concern: Will these bushes be removed, and if so, what are the environmental impacts? These bushes currently play a role in noise mitigation for the neighborhood, which should be considered.

#### 4. Omission of Large Shed from Plans

- Current backyard structure: A large shed occupies approximately one-third of the small backyard, yet it is not referenced in the plans, despite the area being proposed for play space.
- Concern: Clarification is needed as to whether the shed will be removed. If so, this could involve significant disruption, and its current role as a noise buffer for the neighborhood should be considered.

#### 5. Fire and Police Department Safety Study

- Public safety concerns: There is no indication of a fire or police department safety study to evaluate the building's suitability for child care purposes.
- Concern: A comprehensive safety assessment is essential, given the scale of the proposed project, to ensure the safety of children, staff, and the surrounding neighborhood.



I've had my 3 kids go through their program on Santa Clara (1 is still there) and have been extremely pleased with the quality of their programs and staff. Now that two kids are in elementary school, I would love to be able to send them to a Small Size Big Mind aftercare program.

Over the last three years, I have seen the Small Size community in action, minimizing the impact to the surrounding neighborhood. The number of families that arrive on foot or by cargo bike is astounding. And as kids get older, they often ride their own bike alongside their parents and experience the exhilaration of car-free life. Even when people drive, the morning and afternoon congestion is minimal because people arrive over the course of an hour. I also see many of the teachers waiting for the bus at the end of the day, which surely minimizes the impact on parking in the surrounding area.

My older daughter went to Edison, and I know there is a dearth of good after-school programs in the neighborhood. Small Size Big Mind would definitely fill a gap in the after-school care department!

I also know that Small Size Big Mind is very careful about how they work with the community/surrounding neighborhood, as they did everything possible to be responsible neighbors, especially during the height of the Covid pandemic. That is what I love about the school--they always promote community, and I have personally seen Malyka try to help other Alamedans who were in distress (I've seen him around town talking to homeless members who need help and whatnot). I have no doubt in my mind that Malyka and the Small Size Big Mind team would be equally as attentive and caring about the surrounding neighborhood.

I understand that some neighbors have expressed concerns about the opening of Small Size and have launched a CEQA appeal. To me, many of their concerns reek of NIMBYism to me. To Whom It May concern:

I currently live a block away from the proposed 100-child preschool proposed at 3100 Central Avenue. This is a relatively densely populated located that does not seem adequate for the level of pick-ups and drop-offs planned, nor for the planned noise levels. Residents live just on the other side of the fence.

Looking at an overhead view of the nearest major intersection with High St., one can see that the street significantly narrows east of High and the bike lane ends. People dropping off at the preschool, in the likely scenario that they cannot find parking, will either turn up or down High St, or cross to the narrower part of Central.

As I live right near the corner, I have seen people surprised by the end of the bike lane. I have seen car side mirrors knocked off multiple times because cars and bikes are still moving as if they are on a wider street and I have seen cyclists surprised that the lane suddenly ends; I have seen cyclists "doored" multiple times. Many school kids walk along Central and High to reach Edison, Otis, or Lincoln.

Overhead image of the narrowing of the street and the end of the bike lane:



These will be exacerbated by the addition of 200 drop-offs and pick-ups per day. There is also significant traffic and walking families and children alone due to St. Philip Neri, a block away to the south.

I'm sympathetic to the needs of parents with pre-school aged children and I understand why the city wants to help make this happen. However this location is not suitable for moving from a 12-child school to a 100-child school. Please consider another location that will be safer for all and is designed for the ensuing noise levels.

Dear City of Alameda Staff:

My husband and I want to express concerns about the Use Permit for 3100 Central Ave in Alameda (for use as a preschool/daycare). Along with our 3 kids, we live just a few blocks from the site, on Fernside and Liberty, and our children attend school at St Philip Neri. We have had at least one child at SPN school since 2019.

We are aware of the need for additional preschool/daycare sites in Alameda and support additional sites being added to the neighborhood, but are concerned about safety, with a large number of children being squeezed into a very small site on Central. Over the years, we have observed drop off/pick up at SPN, and given parking constraints in the residential neighborhood, there are already concerns about safe drop off. With such a large volume of cars entering the small space, we have serious concerns about children's safety as they cross streets and get to school.

We had a child attend the SPN preschool when it previously occupied part of the site at 3100 Central. Even with only 12 students at that site, there were issues with parking and safely crossing the street with small children. With between 50-100 children squeezed into a single residential lot, and limited visibility, we have extremely serious concerns about children's safety. When I turn onto Central from Fountain st in the mornings, which is the corner of the proposed new preschool/daycare, there is already difficult visibility and I have personally observed near misses with children biking/walking to school on Central, both on the corners of Fountain and High, given that many children going to Lincoln and Otis schools use those streets to commute as well.

We believe that the owners of childcare businesses should be held accountable to locate and purchase sites that have appropriate space for the children attending. Our understanding is that the site is not licensed for the number of proposed children, and that a group of children will need to be rotated outside throughout the day given the lack of space. We have a responsibility to our children to not allow a for-profit childcare business to operate in a potentially unsafe environment.
