Hi,

My name is Daniel Kreindler, and I am a Bay Area resident.

The letter proposed here, or any other such letter should should never be signed by the mayor, as the mayor. Sure, you can all write letters as private citizens, but not in our names.

None of you were elected to represent the citizens of Alameda on any foreign policy matter, You may think this letter is "benign", "balanced", but it is problematic. Take a look at this one sentence I pulled out of the letter:

"...the ongoing destruction of Gaza and escalating humanitarian crisis does nothing to achieve that objective. The seemingly unrestrained violence in Gaza serves no one's interests ..."

I see three problems with this one sentence:

Dear Mayor Ashcraft, Vice Mayor Daysog & Council Members Vella, Spencer & Jensen:

I am writing to you in support of Mayor Ashcraft's proposed letter calling for a cease fire in Gaza. I have shared at city council meetings about friends who have lost multiple family members in Gaza since October 7th. Among them were children and infants. I have also learned last week that another friend lost his 80 year old cousin. My own sadness is very deep, but I cannot imagine the pain that thousands of families are experiencing in this moment mourning their lost family members. In the meantime, most Gazans are displaced from their homes with no water, food, or medical services and are desperately struggling to survive. As the war in Gaza continues, not only are lives of innocent Gazan civilians in peril, but also the lives of Israeli soldiers, and hostages who are still missing from families. All lives are sacred, and all lives should be valued equally. Continued war is not the answer to the current situation, and sadly, proponents of war often label innocent victims of war as "collateral damage."

My own family legacy includes the tragedy of being "collateral damage" of war. My parents on both sides of the family were subjected to mass incarceration during World War II, and my wife's mother and cousin were survivors or "hibakusha" from the atomic bombing in Hiroshima. My son in law is a refugee from Vietnam, the youngest of 13 children, and a survivor of that tragic war. The legacy of intergenerational war trauma informs our family consciousness to oppose war anywhere, and now, specifically in Gaza.

Additionally, you all are aware that I am Co-Chair of the Friends of Wadi Foquin, partnering with the small agricultural village in the Bethlehem District of the West Bank. As the war in Gaza continues, Wadi Foquin is on lock-down, with work stoppages and closure of the children's schools. The nearby settlement has been armed with weapons and military routinely patrols their village. Two homes have been demolished along with a marble factory in recent weeks. Flyers have been distributed warning them to leave and flee to Jordan or be killed. The war in Gaza is interconnected to life in the West Bank. A cease fire will not only save lives in Gaza, but will reduce the aggression and harm taking place in the West Bank.

For those who may claim that our city council should not engage in foreign affairs beyond our jurisdiction, all U.S. citizens are already involved through our taxpayer funds which support the Israeli military infrastructure. The U.S. funds Israel \$3.8 billion a year with conditions that funds must be used to purchase U.S. manufactured weapons. All taxpayers in Alameda, including yourselves, are funding U.S. weapons used to kill Gazan children, babies, and pregnant women. Our vote to support the cease fire letter is a vote to stop further bloodshed. A vote against the letter is silent consent and endorsement for more war and death.

I want to particularly underscore Mayor Ashcraft's words that "...unrestrained violence in Gaza serves no one's interests - not the remaining hostages

Subject: Special Request to Reconsider Sending Proposed Letter on Item 10-D – January 2nd Alameda Council Agenda

Dear Mayor Marilyn Ezzy Ashcraft,

I am a Bay Area resident deeply concerned that the City Council may consider a divisive letter about the Israel-Hamas War. As antisemitism continues to escalate in the Bay Area, and as past examples in Oakland and Richmond show, such action will only further inflame tensions and re-traumatize our impacted communities.

The very discussion on the letter is very likely to be used as a pretext to challenge the very existence of Israel, and use dehumanizing antisemitic tropes, as it happened during other hearings on cease fire resolutions.

In the last few weeks, I sat through hours of public comments on Oakland, Berkeley, and San Francisco sessions of cease fire resolution. These forums were used for expression of pure hate purposeful or based on ignorance. Inflammatory terms such as genocide, apartheid, ethnic cleansing, colonialism, imperialism, and more, were repeated again and again, until accepted as truth.

There was nothing Israel wasn't blamed for, from homelessness, to the use of fossil fuel, to lack of asthma medicine in the pharmacy, and everything in between. It was pure Israel bashing. Just replace "Jews" for "Israel", and it reminded hateful rhetoric some eighty years ago.

Even worse, many of speakers denied that there was a massacre on 10/7, altogether. Some said it was Israel who killed its own citizens. Some exalted the Hamas as a freedom fighter organization. Some booed when the atrocities of the Hamas were even mentioned. Still others said that if there was any killing, it was justified.

And the feeling of Deja Vu grew stronger and stronger.

And there was also just naked antisemitism, for the unsophisticated who did not know, or did not care to mask it as anti-Israel or anti- Zionism: statements from the like of "Jews are controlling the world" to obscene remarks on circumcision.

I was stunned. I was stunned that the council members let in such rhetoric in without as much as a peep of objection or reservation. They set there and let speakers deny that there was ever a massacre. Would they have given a forum to 11/9 deniers? 1,200 people were murdered that horrible Saturday, men, women, young, babies, and elderly, among them my childhood friend. Mati, and her husband, Amir. Some were murdered brutally, after being raped and tortured. But the "esteemed" council members just set there quietly, letting the denials and falsifications be part of the record. What a shameful record.

I must give kudus to Berkely Mayor, Jesse Arreguin, who admirably and fiercely terminated antisemitic calls and remarks mid-sentence.

These vitriol hateful rhetoric do not remain within the council room nor do they end with the hearing, rather they continue to echo and vibrate throughout the community, and create havoc. Since the passing of the Richmond and Oakland resolutions, there has been a marked increase in Jew-hatred in the east bay. Businesses have been vandalized, synagogues have had to pay for expensive extra security, Jewish symbols were defaced or destroyed, and Jewish teachers and students were "greeted" with shouts of "hail Hitler", and the Nazis salute.

Jewish students no longer feel safe at their schools, some having to transfer to schools in areas that have managed to stay above of the fray, and adults are made to feel self-conscious of their Jewishness, and unwelcomed.

And all these for what purpose? Any cease fire must be mutual. Hamas, however, showed time and again, that it will not abide by any such agreement. At the time of the 10/7 attack there was a cease fire in effect that Hamas had violated, as it had violated previous cease fires. A latest temporary cease fire was also violated with Hamas raining Israeli cities with hundreds of rockets. And Hamas swore to continue infiltrating Israel, to carry on murderous sprees similar to 10/7.

As Hamas' charter calls for the annihilation of Jews simply for being Jews ("The Day of Judgment will not come about until Moslems fight Jews and kill them. Then, the Jews will hide behind rocks and trees, and the rocks and trees will cry out: 'O Moslem, there is a Jew hiding behind me, come and kill him." (Article 7)), there is no reason to believe it will respect a new cease fire agreement, any more than it has until now.

Thus, any call for a cease fire is not likely to make any change in the global sense, but it sure going to increase incite, divide, and inflame a community already on edge,

Clearly there were, and presently there are, many conflicts throughout the world that claim the lives of innocent people, including children, many times over, and are much less complex than the Palestinian – Israeli conflict. One wonders why choose this is conflict from all others? Was a similar letter sent with regard to the Ukraine-Russian war? And Ukraine did not even invade Russia, nor swore to obliterate Russia, nor took any aggressive measure against Russia, and is clearly an innocent party in the conflict.

There seems to be an anti-Israel hysteria sweeping the nation. No doubt the Council is pressured to join in. it will be easy to join in, but should it? What will be achieved except more divisiveness, more hate, more polarization, and an invitation to more groups to demand that the city makes their own complex international agenda, the city's agenda. And if this city resists other such requests, how will it explain its choice to single out this conflict?

And there is the equally important question, where does the Council get its mandate to speak for the people in Alameda when nobody elected its members because of their stance on Middle East peace.

I call on the Council, I implore, to vote NO on this resolution, and instead, the Council should take steps to bring Alameda residents together and solve the crucial challenges facing the city.

Furthermore, I am asking the Council to take concrete steps to maintain order and decorum during Tuesday's meeting and all future meetings. The antisemitic comments and actions, violent rhetoric, and amplification of conspiracy theories that have plagued meetings in Oakland, Berkeley, and Richmond, have no place in Alameda.

I'm asking you to stand with ALL Alameda residents – say no to spreading hate, and SAY NO to divisive actions.

I am a Jewish Alamedan writing **in support of item 10D**, Mayor Ashcroft's letter for a ceasefire.

I love our island and am so proud that our leaders are considering a ceasefire letter. Israel's bombings of Gaza have killed tens of thousands of Palestinians, nearly half of them children, while Israel's cutting off of food and water has brought half a million Palestinians to the brink of starvation. Asking that our country use its significant leverage to play a role in working for peace, rather than funding violence, is in total alignment with our values as a community.

Please don't let anyone tell you that Alameda Jews oppose a ceasefire. Jews of Alameda are as diverse as any identity group in our city. The idea that Jews have the same opinion, or share a common political allegiance, is a fundamental tenet of real antisemitism and must be rejected unequivocally.

My synagogue, my rabbis, my children's Hebrew school teachers are calling publicly for a ceasefire. They are among hundreds of thousands of Jews across the country doing the same. Dear Alameda City Council Members,

My name is Lean de Leon and I have been coming to City Council meetings for the past month & half to speak about the ongoing genocide happening in Gaza.

I have been a long-time resident of our beautiful island since the 90s, with family roots here since the 60s, due to the Naval Air Base, where my grandfathers' enlistment into the US army afforded us to migrate here. I am a graduate of Alameda public schools from pre-K to high school, where I was in leadership and represented the student body. I have volunteered at church toy drives, cleaned up beaches, and organized cultural celebrations. I frequent our parks, public libraries, cineplex, and have tried every restaurant on the island. I mentored middle and high school students in their fight for racial justice. So many of my family, both chosen and blood, reside and thrive here.

I love this city deeply & am invested in building with the community.

I am so proud of our Mayor's leadership in agendizing a ceasefire letter to be sent to our federal leaders. I implore other council members to join in passing it!

We know the American people want a ceasefire. We know Alamedans want a ceasefire.

Council members do not turn away from the ongoing genocide happening in Gaza. Please use your platform as our direct local elected officials to push our federal leaders who are failing us. Polling has shown that Americans support a permanent ceasefire and deescalation of violence in Gaza. In a poll from Dec 20, almost **60% of voters want a ceasefire**, where there has been an increase in a month in all three political groupings of Democrats (+4%), Independents (+1%), and Republicans (+11%) (Morning Consult).

Witnessing the genocide has been heartbreaking, to say the least. It was horrific in October. It was nauseating in November. It was miserable during Christmas. And it's a melancholy New Year. Since I spoke last month the death toll of Palestinians by Israel was 15,500, which is now up to almost 22,000. 2/3 are women and children. When I last spoke to you, there were 60 journalists that Israel murdered, it is now up to 100. 1.2 million people in Gaza were displaced, that number has now risen to 1.9 million. Finally, 42% of housing in Gaza was destroyed, a month later it is now recorded at 70%.

We have a moral obligation to speak up. It is our tax money that is supplying the weaponry and artillery used to kill innocent people. A Ceasefire Letter from the City of Alameda

would carry a lot of weight with our history with the Naval Base and military history.

Alameda continues to be connected to a Bay Area economy entrenched in profiting from war. Blood is on our hands as we are part of the killings of thousands of Gazans, including children. All over the Bay Area are offices of companies that manufacture weapons, surveillance technology, and equipment that Israel uses to bomb, surveil, and demolish Palestinians and their homes. Companies include General Dynamics, Boeing, Northrop Grumman, Argon St, Lockheed Martin, Palantir Technology, and Caterpillar. Furthermore, the Oakland Estuary, shared by Alameda and Oakland, serves as a passage for ships that transport weapons and military equipment to Israel. BAE Systems (formerly with an office at 1500 Ferry Point, Alameda, now with two offices in San Jose) partners with Lockheed on the F-35 used to kill Palestinians in Gaza. It also partners with Israeli company Rafael to supply the Israeli military with machine gun systems. Alameda can honor its military history while transforming "swords into plowshares" calling for a Ceasefire Letter and being a local voice for global peace.

Dear Alameda City Clerk,

I've decided to share a letter I sent to family and close friends (including some who live in Israel) on October 17th 2023.

Hi folks,

I've spent several days thinking about what I wish to say and how I wish to say it. I know some of you will disagree with me, and this is ok with me.

For those who don't know, I was raised Jewish, in the conservative movement. I was Bat Mitzvah'd and attended religious school through high school. I went to Brandeis for undergrad.

As someone who is pretty familiar with Judaism's principle beliefs and precepts, it is difficult for me to imagine anything less aligned with the tenets of Judaism as I learned them, than what the Israeli government is doing to the Palestinian people.

It's long been a source of shame in my life that I belong to a people who survived the Holocaust, who have nevertheless gone on to perpetrate another holocaust on another people. We were put in concentration camps, and now we put others in concentration camps. The rhetoric Israeli leaders use when speaking about Palestinians calls to mind the way Nazi leaders spoke about Jews. They called us animals, dehumanized us, and now we do the same to others.

I like being Jewish. I have other identities, but Jewish is the one I most frequently claim publicly. And yet the politics and policies of the Israeli government vis a vis Palestinians have caused me to distance myself from Judaism, from Jewish life and culture. How can I inhabit Jewish spaces, when my position on Palestine brands me an anti-semite, a self-hating Jew?

I think people feel intimidated by Israel and Palestine because we are told that it's a complicated issue. It's not complicated. One side has all the money, power and resources, and the other side has nothing. That's it. When we talk about blame and responsibility for the current situation in Israel, power matters. One side is oppressed, the other side is using their immense power and resources to do the oppressing.

Moreover, the side with the money and power hasn't always held such a privileged position. I don't think it's an exaggeration to say that until relatively recently, the positionality of Jews in the wider world more closely resembled that of Gypsies, or of refugees from North African countries. In many ways, Jews were the original Palestinians, an unwanted people without a homeland, tolerated at best and reviled and targeted at worst.

All of this makes the extraordinary violence perpetrated by the Israeli government on the Palestinian people all the more reprehensible. Is it wrong to say, in light of our history, that

Jews should know better, be better? To my mind, a true Jewish state would be a nation state that welcomed all peoples, that gave deference to and strove to live in harmony with those already living on the land, because Jews, more than many other peoples, know what it is to be oppressed.

People have reached out this past week, checking on me and my family in light of the violent attack by Hamas. While I very much appreciate the concern, and am grateful family and friends in Israel are safe, I find myself wondering: why don't people ask how we are doing whenever the IDF bombs a neighborhood in Gaza, or whenever extremist settlers attack Palesinians in the West Bank? As a Jew, am I only able to grieve the suffering and death of those who look like me, who pray like me?

I've long been disturbed by the fact that the world only talks about Palestinians when something happens to Israelis, when Hamas or Hezbollah or some other militant group commits violence against Jewish Israelis. In between these violent episodes, the plight of the Palestinian people is barely mentioned, despite the fact that the Israeli military regularly commits acts of violence against Palestinian men, women and children, despite the fact that the Israeli government rips Palestinians from their homes as they sanction ever more settlements. Think about that. Palestinian death and suffering only ever matters to the world in the context of Jewish Israeli death and suffering. And it's been this way for years. If your pain and suffering was only ever acknowledged in the context of someone else's pain and suffering, how would that impact your sense of your own humanity?

Make no mistake: this war in Gaza is not just. It is not about Israel's right to defend itself. More violence only serves to endanger the lives of the Israeli hostages taken by Hamas. Contrary to what the Israeli government would have you believe, war will not make Israelis, or Jews, or anyone, any safer. But of course, that's not the goal of Netanyahu or his ilk. The current government of Israel is only too happy for an excuse to continue the ethnic cleansing of the Palestinian people begun in 1948. In that year, 700,000 Palestinians were driven from their homes. Last week, the Israeli government ordered 1.1 million Palestinians living in the North of Gaza to move South or risk death and destruction. We are witnessing a second Nakba.

While it is certainly antisemitic to hate Jews and want to kill Jews for being Jewish, it is not antisemitic to acknowledge the geo-political context surrounding the brutal attack perpetrated by Hamas last week. It is not antisemitic to criticize the government of Israel, to point out the Israeli military's disproportionate power and resources relative to Gaza, or to acknowledge and demand redress for the plight of the Palestinian people. When we try to silence legitimate criticism with charges of antisemitism, when we demand everyone just shut up and support Israel's right to defend itself, we are in dangerous territory as a society. We only have to look at the jingoistic fervor following 9/11 and the ensuing forever wars in Iraq and Afghanistan to know this.

As a Jew, I feel the greatest threat to my safety is not Hamas, or even anti-semitism, but rather the conflation of Zionism with Judaism. I am sick of Israel claiming the mantle of Jewish State, and then perpetrating atrocities against Palestinians, all in the name of keeping Jews safe. It's wrong on many levels.

It is painful to me that my own people call me an anti-semite for saying this. Meanwhile, true anti-semites like John Hagee are welcomed by American Jews with open arms, even though

Christian Zionists like him support Israel for very dubious and self-serving reasons.

So, for the record, I am a proud Jew who supports full Palestinian liberation (and no, I do not think full Palestinian liberation equates to genocide against Jews).

My dad was born in Egypt, and his family had to flee and move to Israel because they were afraid of massacres (pogroms), the same kind that happened on October 7, 2023.

Both of my parents left behind all their belongings-house, money...... to start a new life. I grew up in a one bedroom apartment with a very loving family and although we didn't have much money, my parents cared about my education and taught me to love and give whatever I can to the world around me.

When I came to live and work in the bay area (I did my post doctorate in UC Berkeley), I thought, how great it is to live here, in a community that respects each other and works together regardless of origin, religion or gender. Unfortunately, the ceasefire between Israel and the Palestinians was violated by Hamas on October 7, 2023, massacring 1400 people (children, women, elderly, young adults) in their homes and in the music festival. Till today, Hamas does not agree for a ceasefire that will include the return of the 133 hostages to their families.

My request to you- To continue and keep the balanced life between all communities and encourage positive relationships in Alameda. The conflict between Israel and the Palestinians is complicated and is not for the city to get involved with any declarations. Any declarations regarding this conflict will ignite additional anti-Semitic and islamophobia reactions. As an example, you can see what happened in Oakland during the Hanukkah holiday.






