

Executive Summary

Engagement Overview

From February 2023 - June 2023 the City of Alameda conducted a community and staff engagement effort to gather feedback on a draft Strategic Plan. A myriad of engagement events occurred where Alameda community members and City Staff gave input on a draft vision statement, strategic priority areas, and associated projects lists.

To develop the draft, interviews and surveys were conducted with all five City Council members followed by two City Council retreats that were open for public attendance and comment. City staff weighed in initially through several focus groups and staff meetings. Finally, the draft was shared with the community at large and all city staff through online surveys and in-person engagement events.

Through these in-person events and online surveys **over 1,000 people were engaged** in this process. The City will use this feedback to finalize the Strategic Plan, which will guide the City's priorities for the next three fiscal years.

Findings Overview


Feedback given from both City staff and the community on the draft vision statement and priority areas was generally positive, with both groups agreeing and in support of the language used for both. However, there were some differences in terms of emphasis, with community members placing more importance on infrastructure and city staff emphasizing public transportation. Here are some specific highlights from the feedback that was gathered:

- Both City Staff and community members generally prioritized issues under housing and safety the most
 - Both agree on the need for more affordable housing.
 - Both groups are in support of expanding police presence in high crime areas.
- Both City Staff and community members desire more direct prioritization of diversity, equity, and inclusion, specifically around equitable access to qualify of life resources (ex: mental health services, housing, ADA resources)
- Community members place more importance on infrastructure, specifically a desire
 for the City to invest in infrastructure that supports car usage and is environmentally
 friendly.
- **City Staff** emphasized the importance of **investing in public transportation** due to the possibility of overcrowding that may come with adding more housing and an overall increase in Alameda's population.



Alignment with Vision & Priority Areas

The online survey and in-person engagements invited participants to rank their level of agreement with the draft vision and priority areas. As shown in the pie charts below, the majority of community and staff participants are supportive of the draft vision and priority areas.



Top Projects by Priority Area

The online survey and in-person engagements invited participants to select their top five projects under each priority area. The top five projects for each priority area are shown below. Commonalities between the two groups are color coded.

1. Overview

About the Project

From February 2023 - June 2023 The City of Alameda conducted community and staff engagement efforts to gather feedback on a **draft Strategic Plan**. Developed through careful deliberation by the City Council with input from executive leadership and select City staff, the Draft Plan includes a **vision**, five **strategic priorities**, and a set of **projects** that will guide the City during fiscal years (FY) 2023-24 -2025-26. The engagement effort included in-person events and online surveys, and invited community members and City staff at large to provide input on the draft Strategic Roadmap.

Overview of Feedback Results

There is a high level of **agreement** with the draft vision and strategic priorities among both City Staff and community members. The most frequently referenced issues in the comments from both groups are **Housing** and **Safety**. We also see significant alignment within the project lists in terms of what both groups want to have emphasized and prioritized.

City Staff and community members acknowledge the need for more **affordable housing** and both have cautioned that development in the areas that will add to Alameda's housing stock should be done strategically so as not to overcrowd the island or add more congestion. In terms of safety both groups are in support of **expanding police presence** in high crime areas as well as to help monitor traffic with the goal of reducing accidents and thefts. We see from both groups general concerns for residents' ability to feel safe while walking through the streets of Alameda.

In terms of differences, community members place more importance on **infrastructure** - specifically a desire for the City to invest in infrastructure that supports **car usage**, while continuing to explore and expand transit options. Other frequent community comments mentioned a desire for the City to prioritize the conservation and preservation of **historical buildings** and architecture. Community members also want to see more interconnectedness between infrastructure development and climate resiliency to ensure that the city is taking an environmentally friendly approach to infrastructure and transportation development.

In contrast, City Staff emphasized the importance of investing in **public transportation** due to the possibility of overcrowding that may come with adding more housing and increasing the population. Staff noted that they want to make sure there are sufficient transit options available to meet the needs of community members who either live and/or work in Alameda.



2. Engagement Overview

Approach & Process Overview

From May to June 2023, the City of Alameda worked with their consultant (CivicMakers) to educate and gather input on the draft Strategic from the community at large and city staff across levels and departments. The goals of this effort were to educate staff and the community about the City's strategic planning process, gather input about the degree of alignment between City Council, City staff, and the community, and compile recommended changes or additions to the Plan ahead of adoption by the City Council. Community and staff input was gathered through an online survey and numerous in-person engagements.

To spread the word about these engagement opportunities, the City shared information on the City's website and social media channels, created a printed flier, sent an electronic newsletter to more than 30,000 subscribers, and provided an update during City Manager Communications at a City Council meeting.

The City project team will provide this report to the City Council along with the final Draft Strategic Plan (that incorporates comments and suggestions) for their review during a September 2023 workshop prior to final adoption.

Engagement Opportunities

Community engagement about the Strategic Plan was intended as an educational opportunity about this first citywide Strategic Plan and to capture a high-level snapshot of community sentiment from those who were interested in participating. In-person engagement opportunities for **community members** included 5 pop-up workshops at well-trafficked locations around the City, 2 online workshops, and an online survey.

In-person engagement opportunities for **city staff** included various staff meetings, gallery walk displays at **12 locations** (for staff to review information and add comments on their own time), and an online survey.

These engagement opportunities allowed community members and City staff to provide feedback on the draft vision statement, draft strategic priority areas, and draft project lists. Community members were also able to ask questions and share their feedback at a later time online. At the in-person pop-up workshops, staff heard from **more than 100 people** about their priorities for the City. Of note was the variety of the feedback heard, with the shared sentiment of feeling lucky to live in Alameda and feeling grateful for the opportunity to participate.

Online Survey





Vision Statement & Priorities Poll: Summary of Results









Overall, to what extent do you agree or disagree that the **draft vision statement** reflects the current <u>needs and priorities of the community</u>?







Draft Priority Areas Poll: Summary of Results









To what extent do you agree or disagree that the **draft priorities** reflect the n<u>eeds and priorities of the community</u> for the coming three years?

Key Themes from Comments: Vision Statement & Priority Areas

Participants were asked to share comments in response to the draft vision and priorities. The comments below were summarized by theme and organized in order of frequency.

- Preserve community buildings/institutions (i.e. hospitals, schools, historic buildings and architecture)
- Build transportation infrastructure that will reduce traffic congestion
- DEIB Ensure that the city's infrastructure is accessible for older adults and people living with disabilities

Transportation

- Desire for more of an emphasis on reducing traffic congestion via offering accessible "Transportation Choices"
- Emphasis on offering transportation choices that correlate to rising population with the goal of not creating more traffic

- More investment in bringing community together in publicly accessible spaces "We are missing prioritizing creating and nurturing community events and community spaces"
- More access to public art and public spaces, especially public pools
- More investment in publicly accessible resources for young adults and seniors (art programs) and tech skill building programs)
- DEIB: Investment in safety and quality of life resources that also have a focus on supporting minorities and vulnerable populations

Climate

- Vision statement should include climate mitigation, including citizens working towards reducing global GHG emissions.
- Vision statement should mention investing in city infrastructure to support the current population in the event of a major natural disaster (i.e. tubes, bridges, food supplies)
- Want to see a higher allocation of budget towards dealing with future consequences of sea level rise.

Education

- More direct mention of education as a focus area within the Priority Areas
- Increase educator pay/salaries
- Make sure resources are allocated to school districts according to their district's population size

Community Investments

 DEIB: More direct reference to the City of Alameda prioritizing equity, diversity, inclusion, and accessibility.



Economic Development

- More emphasis on economic development that will attract new businesses.
- Stronger encouragement for industries to pay livable wages to employees, so they can afford to live in Alameda (e.g., construction companies).

Employment

- Proportional health and retirement benefits for part-time employees (want to make sure that becoming more "fiscally responsible" does not include over reliance on part time employees or not providing them benefits)
- Investment in City staff locations/buildings (with an emphasis on safety)

Climate

- More education & direct facilitation offered to the public on how to help the environment and live more sustainably
- Would like to see more environmentally friendly public transit choices made available and conveniently accessible at all times
- A strong desire to have more of the interconnectedness between the "Build Resilience" SP Area and "Transportation & Infrastructure" SP Area
 - i.e. the creation of public green spaces, planting more trees, encouragement of environmentally friendly public transit, etc..
- Would like to see more of an emphasis on climate adaptation and preparedness (preparing for the future consequences of climate change and major earthquakes)

Economic Development

- A desire to promote more citizen participation in budgeting priorities (i.e. participatory budgeting)
- More of an emphasis on allocating budget to particular strategic priority areas to prepare for future needs (e.g., sea level rise)



Policing

- Investment in better training and tools for the police officers (with more emphasis on community policing without the use of force and less military style policing)
- Better police responsiveness and response times
