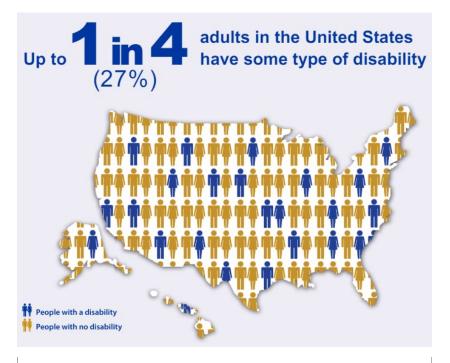

PARKING AND DROP-OFF

- Accessible parking
- Loading and unloading areas



ACCESSIBLE ROUTES

Paths of travel to facility entrance and within the facility



AMENITIES

Access to public amenities and services



RESTROOMS

Lavatories, toilets, urinals, dispensers



RECREATION

Playgrounds, sports fields, sport courts, picnic areas

2,884 barriers identified across 58 sites

PEDESTRIAN FACILITIES SURVEY

Public Right of Way Accessibility Guidelines

- 2,862 curb ramps
- 89 signalized intersections
- 220 miles of sidewalk
- 22.6 miles of pathways



Public Right-of-Way Accessibility Guidelines

Pedestrian Access Routes (sidewalks, multi-use paths, etc..)

- Minimum 4-foot width with no protruding objects between 27" and 80"
- Firm, stable, and slip-resistant surface; no large holes/openings
- 2% cross slope, 5% running slope
- Vertical change less than ¼"

Curb Ramps

- 1:12 max running slope, 1:48 cross slope
- Landing
- Flush transitions (no lips)
- Detectable Warning Surface

Signalized Street Crossings

- Pedestrian Signal, adequate crossing time, countdown display
- Accessible Pedestrian Signals (APS) location, Audible and vibro-tactile detectors, etc...

ACCESSIBLE CITY PROGRAMS AND SERVICES

- 54 recommendations to enhance accessibility across City programs and services
- 3-year implementation timeline
- Each recommendation has a fiscal year to be complete by
- Inter-departmental task force led by ADA Coordinator

A few highlights of the work ahead

- *Enlist people with a variety of disabilities to test the City webpage for accessibility and ease of use.
- ❖ Include a listing/description amenities at facilities where programs take place.
- Ensure emergency and disaster related programs are accessible
- Ensure all City notifications include information on the accommodation process.
- Develop a policy regarding ADA training for City staff.

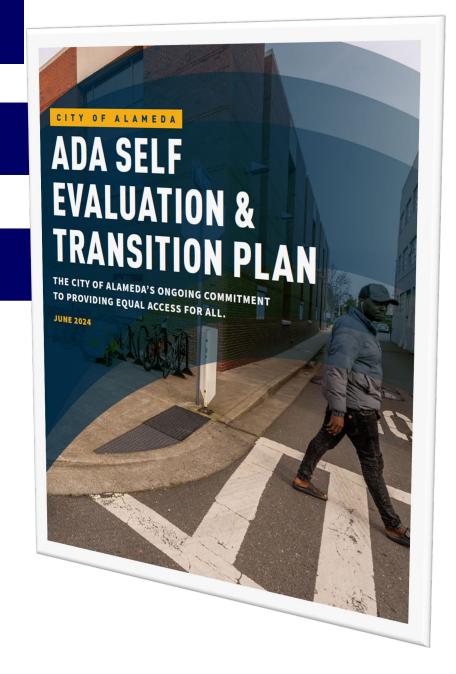
NEXT STEPS
