Dear Mayor Ezzy Ashcraft,

Thank you for meeting with Jewish Alamedans and myself today. I am sorry that illness kept me from attending in person.

As I said during our meeting, I do not believe a letter on behalf of our city is an appropriate use of council time. I recognize that you placed it on the agenda from a place of deep concern for all civilians affected by the conflict. On the other hand, I disagree with you that there is only one morally appropriate response to the state of war Hamas created on October 7.

I was involved in peace activism for many years prior to attending rabbinical school. While serving as the Program Chair for the US Section of Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, I was selected to co-lead a fact-finding mission to Israel and Palestine. Yet, despite my years of work on the issue, other American activists distrusted me so much that they got the trip scuttled by cutting off funding. Why did people who had worked with me for years distrust me so much? First because I'm a Jew and second, because I didn't want to use rhetoric that painted all Israelis / Jews as Evil.

Ultimately, after using an extraordinary amount of personal time on peace activism, I formally cut ties with the Women's International League for Peace & Freedom. Though I remain quite proud of many of its accomplishments during my time as a member (especially UN Security Council Resolution 1325 and subsequent resolutions that insist on women's involvement in peace-building), I realized that the primary thing being accomplished by its activism on Israel and Palestine was making Jews less safe globally.

Similarly, my activism with the US Conference of Mayors was as an outsider, lobbying local mayors and working with a national coalition of activists to promote the passage of the resolution Calling on Congress to End the Wars in Iraq and Afghanistan and Bring the Money Home to the Needs of Our Cities.

That was 10 years after those wars began, not two months. Additionally, my political perspective has widened since 2011. It is quite difficult for citizens, even locally-elected politicians, to affect foreign policy. I deeply understand how frustrating that is, as the proper functioning of the UN and international norms was what I cared about most as an activist.

I am willing to participate in listening sessions that help bridge the divides between communities on the island. I believe in the power of well-facilitated dialog. I do not believe your letter, or the public comments to the agenda item at the January 2nd Alameda City Council Meeting, will improve the quality of life for citizens of Alameda or civilians anywhere in the world. It will only increase division and animosity between people here in Alameda and will not have any affect on US foreign policy.

All this referral does is legitimize anti-Israel and anti-Jewish bias, by making it seem that the primary impediment to peace is Israel and Israel's military choices. As Superintendent Scuderi said in his letter to the AUSD community, we aren't going to figure out the solution to the war in Alameda. The most we can do is hold space where everyone is truly welcome.

I have been an Alameda resident for 22 years, and a local realtor for 18 of those years. I raised a son in town into adulthood, himself a proud Alamedan.

The city council has been charged with addressing the many challenges of education, housing, base development, and climate change. Appropriately the council has not been dealing with international issues that do not relate to the specific responsibilities with which it has been tasked. The council has not taken a position on the Syria war, Ukraine/Russia war, the conflict in Yemen, or Myanmar. I can't imagine why that should change. The council in not in a position to address international issues, no matter the personal feelings of its members. And if a letter about the Israel/Gaza conflict goes out, there should be similar letters demanding a ceasefire in every other conflict. Why take a position only about one that involves Israel, the only Jewish state in the world? Choosing ONLY this conflict in which Alameda has a position shows a clear bias.

Other cities that have taken a position on the tragic war in Israel/Gaza have resulted in heightened antisemitism. The videos of vitriolic antisemitism at the Oakland city council have made their way around the world. My name is Maxim Gurevich and I have been a resident of Alameda for more than 6 years.

I am writing to you regarding the proposed agenda item about the Middle East conflict and the call for a ceasefire, scheduled for discussion in the upcoming meeting. As a concerned member of our community, I appreciate the Council's willingness to engage with significant global issues. However, I wish to express my reservations about the appropriateness and potential impact of bringing this specific topic to our local government forum.

This hearing, intended to address rising antisemitism on college campuses, resulted in a <u>significant</u> <u>controversy</u>, with the House of Representatives condemning the presidents' responses as evasive and dismissive, and leading to at least one resignation. The incident underscores how even well-intentioned discussions on such topics can lead to misunderstandings, divisiveness, and unintended consequences, even among seasoned leaders and experts.

In addition to the points raised, I wish to highlight the impact of our actions and discussions on the younger generation. It is crucial, therefore, that we approach topics like the Middle East conflict with a sense of responsibility, aiming to educate rather than polarize.

Ceasefire is a moral issue. As a resident of Alameda, I believe that our community has a role to play in advocating for a peace in Gaza. The images and reports of civilian casualties, including children, are deeply distressing. It is clear that a lasting solution can only be achieved through diplomatic efforts and a commitment to dialogue. Our Congresswoman Barbara Lee has signed on to the congressional ceasefire resolution and was courageous in her disavowal of the war in Iraq. Endorsing a ceasefire in Alameda not only follows her leadership, but adds constituent weight to her position and adds our city to the growing list of municipalities taking a moral stand.

Ceasefire is a local issue. <u>US Campaign for Palestinian Rights</u> estimates that Alameda taxpayers give \$1,115,883 to fund Israel's violence against Palestinian people. Those tax dollars could be coming back into our community for needed services. Additionally, Alameda is home to hundreds of union members and community members whose unions and community organizations have endorsed an immediate ceasefire.

I understand that international conflicts are complex, and our local government may have limited influence on global affairs. However, by taking a principled stand, Alameda can contribute to the collective voice advocating for peace and the protection of civilian lives.

I appreciate your attention to this matter and trust that you will consider the urgency of the situation. I look forward to hearing about any actions our city council may take to address this critical issue.

Like many members of the East Bay Jewish community, I feel dismayed and apprehensive about your decision to include a ceasefire resolution on your January 2nd agenda. Resolutions that were passed by Oakland and Richmond have led to a greater tolerance for hate speech and acts of anti-Semitism against Jews and Jewish institutions.

You were elected to make informed decisions about matters that affect the lives and wellbeing of the residents of Alameda. rather than to deal with complex issues on platforms of foreign policy. Your most fundamental responsibility is to keep your constituents safe. Safety and a feeling of security are at stake with the proposed divisive resolution, which would fan the flames of hatred and violence toward Jews in your community and in the larger Bay Area. Jewish families in Oakland and Richmond have felt the impact of the hostility, which is not focused just on Israel but has been generalized to Jewish people. Dear Mayor Ashcraft and Councilmembers:

Since I retired from teaching at AHS and leading the Alameda Education Association, I've missed participating in Alameda affairs (I live in Oakland), but I did want to reach out about the Israel-Hamas resolution you are considering.

There are many reasons for a city council not to weigh in on this matter, and here are mine: I urge this body **not to consider** a ceasefire resolution.

I attended both the Alameda County Central Democratic Committee's and the Oakland City Council's hearing on such resolutions, and it was absolutely heartbreaking. *Not* because reasonable people were reasonably debating a complex issue, but because the hearings were simply forums for hatred.

I sat through hours of people heckling rabbis, laughing at Jewish community leaders, shouting social media memes that Zionists are evil; that Jews have all the money, that Israel, not Hamas, raped, killed and mutilated its own people; that Jews aren't Semites and have no connection to the Holy Land; that Hamas is a powerless, benign force, etc. And Zoom attendees? Some had swastika backgrounds and dollar sign backgrounds. I saw few people modeling the peace they were advocating for.

When I sought to share my talking points about Hamas (five facts from Palestinian sources) with a red-headed, freckle-faced young man, he accepted my paper and tore it up. Then laughed at me.

It broke my heart: I've always assumed that speaking face-to-face, human-to-human can move us from positions to shared interests. Not in a mob, it appears. The atmosphere in the room was akin, honestly, to a Trump rally with people chanting, "Lock her up! Lock her up!" It was a mob drunken with righteousness.

This is what you will inviting to the City of Alameda (and beyond) if you put a ceasefire resolution on. Is this what you want? Is this the wise way forward for sweet Alameda?

The history of the Holy Land is complex and complicated — it is a history of battle and strife, as it's an ancient trade-route crossroad. Did you know the term "Armeggedon" comes from a plain in central Israel called *Meggido*, next to a mountain the word for which in Aramaic and Hebrew is *har*. "Har Meggido" was the name of this plain where important trade routes crossed. Hellish, gruesome clashes between ancient tribes broke out often enough that, by the time of the Christian Bible, the name had become equated with the end of the world.

The last 75 years of history, since the establishment of the State of Israel, is a product of that long, fractious history. Without this Body understanding all that history, to wade into the debate, no matter how noble a desire, will add to, not lessen hatreds.

I would absolutely encourage this body to aid the path to local peace around this war. Creating a space where the local Jewish and Muslim leaders can speak to each other and share each others' pain, perhaps? Or a forum where people of all faiths who want to listen to each other and replicate the peace we all presumably want, perhaps?

But a resolution that changes nothing in the actual war, and creates a forum for hatred here at home, I would urge, is neither wise politics nor wise humanity.

I am writing in support of the council <u>voting yes to authorize Mayor Ashcraft to send a</u> <u>letter in favor of a ceasefire.</u> I am a Jewish resident of Alameda who is a songleader and music educator at a prominent synagogue in the East Bay. My own Jewish values have led me to stand unequivocally in favor of a ceasefire.

As the grandchild of two Holocaust survivors, I understand the intergenerational fear and trauma within my community. I am horrified both by the attacks on October 7 and by the ongoing mass casualties and population displacement in Gaza. This violence will not make anyone safer; in the long run, only ceasefire and de-escalation can make everyone safer.

Mayor Ashcraft's letter is incredibly thoughtful. I appreciate that she condemns the actions of both Hamas and Israel, and that she calls for the release of all hostages and the establishment of lasting peace.

Some people might say that this issue is outside the scope of the city of Alameda. I would argue that this is very much a local issue. There are people in Alameda with deep connections both to Israel and to Palestine, and this letter is a way of expressing support for those who are in harm's way. Furthermore, our federal tax dollars are directly funding the ongoing invasion and bombardment of Gaza. If we do not speak up and put pressure on the federal government, our silence can be taken as support.

Some members within my community believe that Mayor Ashcraft's letter will lead to divisive and hateful rhetoric. Antisemitism is a real and present threat, but sending a letter to the federal government in support of a ceasefire will not stoke hatred that does not already exist. We must stand against antisemitism, and we must also work through fear and discomfort as a community to stand up for what is right. These two things are not in opposition. In fact, I believe that one is not possible without the other.


Alameda demands our government withdraw from the Middle East now. There is no benefit to America in maintaining a presence in the Middle East.

Mayor Ashcraft-

I'm writing to you as an Alameda citizen (since 2019) who voted for you in 2022. I appreciated your attendance at the South Shore menorah lighting. And I have recently expressed pride to friends and family that Alameda's city council and school system stood out amongst its Bay Area peers in its good judgment to stay neutral on international issues.

So I was surprised and saddened to see your decision to discuss a resolution calling for a ceasefire at the next city council meeting. I think this decision is misguided for the following reasons:

1. By declaring that you must speak out against "intense suffering" you commit yourself to issuing statements about a wide range of issues and conflicts across the world where you lack expertise and open yourself to charges of hypocrisy. Should we expect statements on the 20 million displaced people in Ethiopia who lack food and shelter next week? How about the Sudanese genocide? Syria's massacre of its own citizens? How about Nigeria's genocide? The Russia/Ukraine war? If this is the only global statement the City of Alameda chooses to make, then why?

2. You mention the need to "set an example of ethical leadership." With all due respect, leadership isn't identifying a bad situation but it's providing solutions. There was a ceasefire in place on October 6th that Hamas broke and again during the most recent truce and just this week Hamas has rejected Israel and Egypt's proposal for a ceasefire. Hamas has also stated unequivocally that they plan to continue to attack Israel. What do you suggest Israel do?

I understand the number of civilian casualties is devastating but as Antony Blinken and John Kirby have stated, this is a direct reflection of Hamas intentionally putting civilians in harm's way. Hamas is cynically doing this to drive outrage against Israel. We *should* hold Israel to a high standard but what will this statement positively accomplish other than reward Hamas for their cynicism?

3. You mention the need to "amplify citizens' voices" to elected officials. On this point, I strongly disagree, There is an established channel for citizens to advocate on federal positions. The role of Mayor is not to lobby for select citizen interests but to advocate directly for the *city's* interests of which this does not qualify. I appreciate there is a vocal group advocating for this resolution but because I - and other Jewish citizens - don't feel comfortable being as vocal that means our interests get superseded. Should the next aggressively outspoken group expect to have their position amplified as well?

4. Most importantly, this makes Alameda Jews less safe. Already, I feel unsafe taking my children to synagogue and other public Jewish events - such as the menorah lighting. I feel the need to assess people lurking nearby and evaluating their threat. These are not merely imagined fears as synagogues across the country have received bomb threats, been shot at, and graffitied - including here in the Bay Area (a couple notable examples <u>here</u> and <u>here</u> if you haven't been following along).

By passing this resolution you validate the false impression that Israel is perpetrating THE biggest injustice in the world. And like it or not, there are people who will blame Alameda Jews for this conflict and feel justified to take action. For what benefit are we trading our safety for?

I will reluctantly attend the next city council meeting to express my sentiment in person. I say reluctantly because at numerous rallies and other similar public events around the country, citizens advocating for Israel have been harrassed and in some instances physically attacked - in one case lethally so. I do not want that and would much prefer to stay home and avoid any confrontation. But in the spirit of ethical leadership, I feel obligated to advocate against this misguided resolution.

Hillary Clinton says those who call for a permanent ceasefire do not understand Hamas.

A ceasefire existed on October 6. Hamas broke it.

A ceasefire existed a few weeks ago. Hamas broke it.

The message of a ceasefire is this: that the status quo in Gaza is acceptable. That it is ok to ritually execute LGBTQ+ Palestinians, that it is ok to call for the slaughter of Jews worldwide. That it is ok to shoot people who try to access aid, that it is ok to illegally take unilateral power after a free and fair Palestinian election, then suppress further elections for 18 years. Indeed, calls for a ceasefire are part of the worldwide psychological warfare of Hamas.

Here in the Bay Area, these kinds of resolutions put Jews in danger, as their neighbors and friends turn on them. Anti-Zionist groups calling for a ceasefire, like Jewish Voice for Peace and If Not Now, are loud, but they are in the minority. More than 90% of American Jews identify as Zionist, which means they support Jewish self-determination in the Jewish indigenous homeland. These resolutions endanger our community. During Hanukkah, a public menorah was vandalized and thrown into Lake Merritt, with antisemitic writing where it once stood. The silence and lack of courage from our Bay Area political leaders in the face of these incidents have been a chilling throwback to other times in Jewish history.

These resolutions accomplish nothing but to endanger Bay Area Jews. Please use your logic, don't be intimidated, and don't cave to the mob. Please vote no.

Dear City Council,

I write to share with you the letter I have sent to Mayor Ashcraft:

Dear Mayor Ashcraft,

I am Jewish resident of Alameda just a degree of separation from people who were abducted and killed on 10/7. They are friends of my friends. I want to see a ceasefire for humanitarian reasons and I want the hostages to come home. I agree with much of your letter but I object to language characterizing the IDF's operations as "seemingly unrestrained violence" and the assertion that they accomplish nothing for the safety of Israel. 10/7 is what unrestrained violence looks like. Unrestrained violence does not entail warning Gazans to evacuate areas ahead of strikes, nor humanitarian aid. At the same time, there is nowhere near as much restraint as there should be and the tragic and horrible casualty numbers demonstrate that. It's also true that while we will learn in time whether the war is ultimately counterproductive to Israeli security, in the short term dismantling Hamas infrastructure and reducing its capabilities to attack Israel via indiscriminate rocket fire in civilian areas or otherwise has some impact on Israeli security. If you are going to mention "seemingly unrestrained violence" you should say "in Gaza and southern Israel," which has been subjected to about 12,000 rocket attacks during this war and whose residents have also been subject to mass displacement (as well as northern communities). It does not diminish the suffering of Gazans to acknowledge that. And to assert it serves no U.S. security interests in the complex environment of the Middle East, when Hamas, Hezbollah, and the Houthis are armed and funded by Iran, is overly simplistic and unexplained in your letter.

I would ask you to consider revisions to your letter with relation to the points identified above to focus on ending the suffering of the people of Gaza and of Israel. It will be less divisive if you steer clear of sweeping assertions you do not need to make to support a ceasefire. The reality is that even if you don't want your letter to make anyone feel unsafe, it will. But so will not sending it. I urge you to minimize the divisiveness of your letter by basing your call for a ceasefire on ending the humanitarian suffering.
