I write to update you on significant activities occurring at the Alameda Free Library in May and June 2025 and inform you of future activities.

PERSONNEL

Staffing Update

On June 30, Sicilia Smith started as a full-time library technician. They primarily work at the Bay Farm Island Library. Sicilia has previous library experience at Santa Cruz Public Libraries and San Rafael Public Library. They also have an educational background in early childhood education.

One part-time library specialist left employment with the Library in June.

Recruitment for Two New Full-Time Librarians

The Library will begin the recruitment process for two new full-time librarians this month. The positions were approved by City Council on June 17 along with the 2025-27 biennial budget.

COLLECTION, RESOURCES & SERVICES

Realigned Hours Begin October 6

Prioritizing when the Library is most used by the community, the Library will adjust its operating hours on Monday, October 6. Overall, the Library will be open one additional hour per week across its three locations. Communication to the public about the realigned hours will begin in September.

Strategic Planning Process

With the release of the community survey in July, the Library entered a new phase in the

process to develop a new five-year strategic plan. The survey is available in English, Spanish, and Chinese and community members may complete it until July 31. Postcards will be mailed to targeted neighborhoods encouraging them to complete the survey. The first postcards will arrive the week of July 14.

Additionally, all libraries have engagement boards where people share information about their visit and what would improve their experience. The in-library engagement is available in English and Spanish and will also be available until July 31.

<u>WhaZoodle</u>

The Library recently added WhaZoodles to its collection. WhaZoodle is a screen-free audio learning device for kids ages 3-12 that has thematic content and runs for about two hours. Each device has three modes:

- Explore mode offers child-friendly podcasts, fun facts, sing-alongs, and short stories.
- Recess mode gets the listener moving with dancing, drawing, crafts, and more.
- Relax mode offers guided meditations or stretches and sleep or nature sounds to help the listener wind down.

WhaZoodles checkout for three weeks and may be renewed twice if other patrons are not waiting to use them.




PROGRAMS AND EVENTS

Summer Reading Challenge

As of June 30, 4,025 people have registered for the 2025 Summer Reading Challenge. Children represent the largest group of participants at 2,730, followed by 1,071 adults, and 224 teens. According to Library Services Manager Eva Volin, 2025 is the first time the Library has had more than 4,000 people participate. The Summer Reading Challenge runs through July 31, which is also the last day to collect prizes.

The Summer Reading Challenge started on Sunday, June 1, when more than 800 people visited the Main Library to register, participate in family-friendly games, and attend a puppet show.
