#### Recommendation

Provide City Council objectives and priorities for ~\$28 million of funding from the Federal Government through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)

### What we know so far about rules

#### So far, ARPA funds are to be used for:

- To respond to public health emergency with respect to the COVID-19 pandemic or its negative economic impacts;
- To respond to workers performing essential work during the COVID-19 public health emergency and/or for routine payroll contributions;
- For the provision of government services to the extent of the reduction in revenue\* of such metropolitan city; and
- To make necessary investments in water, sewer, or broadband infrastructure.

[ARPA funds must be spent by the end of calendar year 2024]

#### Funds cannot be used for

- Funds allocated to states cannot be used to directly or indirectly to offset tax reductions or delay a tax or tax increase;
- Funding debt service; legal settlements or judgments;
- No rainy-day/reserve funding; and
- Funds cannot be deposited into any pension fund.

# Perspective on Use of Funds

- Significant Opportunity
  - General guidance now will be helpful as we approach the budget workshop next month (anticipating US Dept. of Treasury rules and guidance in early May)
- One-time Funds
  - Minimize creating new programs that require ongoing expenditures.
  - Replenishing lost revenue may offer greater flexibility for use of funds (~\$15.5M)
- Move with Purpose, but Don't Rush
  - o Two equal distributions (first in 2021, then one-year later in 2022)
  - Deploy expeditiously, but be strategic

## Framework for Consideration

- City Council Priorities
  - Preparing Alameda for the Future
  - Encouraging Economic Development Across the Community
  - Supporting Enhanced Livability and Quality of Life
  - Protecting Core Services
  - Ensuring Effective & Efficient Operations

# Other options

- Use the ARPA Eligibility List
  - Fairly narrow list of items; will require more information from Treasury
- Identify Specific or Unique Needs
  - Identify priorities not put forward in the "priority project list"
- Priority Projects
  - Projects put forward City needs (and/or community partnerships (i.e., non-profits)

# Projects Put Forward to Date\*

- 22 or so requests from department and segments of the community like the housing authority
- Council may have additional requests for consideration
- Treasury Department rules will be instructive
- Far more demand than funding available

<sup>\*</sup> All projects may not be eligible for ARPA funding – awaiting spending rules from Treasury
