


Alameda's Vision

City Council Strategic Priorities




To achieve the City's vision, the City Council adopted 5 Strategic Priorities:

- 3. Promote greater local control in light of uncertainties in federal funding






Hundreds of Millions in Infrastructure Needs

Streets & Traffic Safety: Key Issues

Backlog of roadway repairs and needs to address City's aging, deteriorating infrastructure

128 miles of publicly maintained streets

89 signalized intersections, many nearing the end of their useful life

25 million square feet of pavement

7,000+ streetlights

25,000+ street and park trees

260 miles of sidewalks

18 miles of multi-use trails, many substandard and deteriorating

59 miles of existing bikeways



Streets & Traffic Safety: Key Issues (cont.)

Significant plans for new unfunded infrastructure:

- A goal to <u>eliminate all fatal and severe</u> <u>injury crashes</u> on our streets
- Active transportation and climate plans call for <u>reducing emissions</u> by transforming our streets into <u>safe streets for all</u>, including 15 miles of new multi-use trails, 50+ new miles of bikeways, and more street trees
- The new <u>Accessibility Transition Plan</u> includes ADA projects with <u>insufficient</u> <u>funding</u>







Streets & Traffic Safety: Targeted Outcomes

- Address the City's needs before they become more expensive in the future
- Make Alamedans safer by reducing crashes
- Reduce greenhouse gas emissions from greener and more walkable and bikeable streets
- Protect the City from the whims of the federal government



Previously Completed Projects











Example Projects & Preliminary Costs

Project	Est. Cost
STREETS: Street maintenance over 5 years: repair potholes, older pavements	\$70 million
Sidewalk deferred maintenance and ADA required curb ramp upgrades	\$35 million
Traffic signal upgrades to improve traffic flow and limit congestion	\$10 million
TRAFFIC SAFETY: Add 3 roundabouts to reduce crashes and improve traffic	\$15 million
Add 50 miles of bikeways to reduce severe injury and fatal crashes	\$70 million
Complete projects in the Low Stress Backbone Bikeway Network	\$45 million
Add 3 miles of priority multi-use trails providing safe paths for walking/biking	\$14 million
Replace the Bay Farm wooden bike/ped bridge	\$15 million
