Background Information

- 22-acre parcel purchased from Southern Pacific Railroad at its original purchase price due to advocacy efforts of Jean Sweeney.
- May 2013: Council approved six recreation use types following an extensive community input process.
 - Walk and bike trails
 Natural open space
 Picnic areas
 - Community gardens
 Natural playgrounds
 Open lawn areas
- April 2014: Recreation and Park Commission recommended final Master Plan.
- Kristoffer Köster of KK Design Studio, and Planning Board member, developed the draft Master Plan pro bono.

Master Plan Strategies

- Uses approved recreation use types as the foundation.
- Groups more active areas on outside edges, for cost efficiency and to preserve quieter central area.
- Cross Alameda Trail along northern edge.
- Tree buffer as a natural sound barrier for residential.
- Parking lots to draw parking away from residential.

Revisions to Master Plan

Made the overall design less "developed"

Added the right of way for future transit

Changed the community garden to 1-acre fenced plots and 1-acre of demonstration gardens and urban orchard. This also opens up the park entrance on Constitution Way and makes it more prominent.

Moved the outdoor classroom to the west, adjacent to the garden.

Made the frog pond smaller and extended the dry creek east and west. This entire water feature will be a seasonal creek that is part of the storm drainage system.


Made the "Great Lawn" smaller

Added a grass hill on the east side


Removed the bike park and added the bike skills track loop



Community Garden

- 1-acre community plot garden adjacent to the Alameda Food Bank.
- 1-acre of informational demonstration gardens and urban orchard
- Community Garden Steering Committee with representatives from Alameda Backyard Growers, Project Leaf and Alameda County Master Gardeners
- Collaborative efforts to provide free plots and produce for the Food Bank.

CEQA

- City is circulating the draft Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) evaluating the potential environmental impacts of the proposed project.
- The draft MND finds that the park project has minimal environmental impacts, and those that do occur are related to the construction period (e.g. dust, construction traffic, etc.) Those potential impacts are identified and mitigations are recommended to minimize those impacts.

Next Steps

- Recommendations to City Council July 15, 2014
- Once approved, this Master Plan will be the roadmap for fundraising, final design, and park development.
- Park development is unfunded. Timeline and scope will be dependent upon securing grants and private donations from businesses and individuals.
- Total budget estimate = \$8 Million
