Prior Council Actions

A 2020 Charter Review Subcommittee resulted in three ballot measures being presented to voters at the past two elections:

- 2020 City Prosecutor (passed)
- 2020 Article 26 (failed)
- 2022 Council Salary (passed)



Candidate Statement

Current:

- \$100 deposit
- Actual costs billed after election
 - 2020 over \$4,000 and 2022 just under \$4,000
- Actual amount can differ from estimate
- Final bill can be very delayed
 - Candidates might want to terminate campaign committees earlier

Candidate Statement

Proposal:

- \$100 deposit
- \$900 billed after election
- Candidates know amount and have time to raise/save funds
- Will decrease cost recovery
- Requires upfront payment if a candidate has a balance due from prior election (implements Referral)

Election Reform

- Election reform included as a Strategic Priorities Project
- Referral submitted by Vice Mayor Daysog proposes to increase the size of the Council
- Initiative not filed proposed to add Ranked Choice Voting to the City Charter
- District elections could be established if the City receives a demand letter or if voters adopt a Charter amendment
 - FAIRS MAPS Act of 2023 revised State regulations
- Council can raise other issues of interest



Staff Recommendation

Staff recommends Council adopt the resolution pertaining to candidate statement regulations and Council can also provide direction on any other election issues
