#### Dear Alameda City Council,

Thank you for having the courage to carefully consider the context of the conflict in Israel and the ramifications locally of a resolution. The easy way out would certainly be to cave to the pressure, to the false comparisons to other conflicts, and to have the same knee jerk reaction to condemn Israel as so many have. The stories and images are certainly horrific. My heart breaks for the death and suffering of so many innocent civilians in Gaza. It is hard to imagine how Israel's current actions could lead to peace. But it is even harder to imagine Palestinians ever enjoying lasting peace while under the heel of the brutal Hamas dictatorship, whose stated mission is the destruction of the State of Israel.

Understanding history is key to finding a solution. There was a thriving Jewish State in Israel long before Islam or Palestinians even existed. Sadly, the Jews of Israel were butchered and driven from their land by many conquerors including Greeks, Romans, Crusaders, Ottomans and Turks. Around 1900 Jewish refugees in Eastern Europe, who were suffering from mass rapes, kidnappings, and murders at the hands of the Cossacks, began to return to their homeland. At the time, Palestine was an inhospitable land and very sparsely populated by small groups of both Arabs and Jews. The returning Jews were incredibly industrious, draining swamps, building irrigation systems and other infrastructure, and the desert began to bloom. Many Arabs from Egypt, Yemen, and elsewhere moved to Palestine to partake in this resurgence.

In the wake of the Holocaust the UN granted the Jews in Palestine the right to self-determination. The surrounding Arab countries, who already ruled 99% of the Middle East, immediately attacked Israel from all sides, determined to drive the Jews from the last 1%. The Arabs in Palestine sided with their Arab brothers. Miraculously the Jews survived (only to be attacked again in 1956, 1967, 1973, etc). The Arab countries expelled all their Jews (about 1 million), who were gladly accepted by Israel. To improve its chances of survival, Israel tried to expel some of the Arabs within their midst (few thousands) to the neighboring countries from which many Arabs had just recently emigrated. The Arab countries would not allow them in. Instead, they were herded into the West Bank and Gaza. The Arab leaders could have solved the Arab-Israeli conflict long ago, by simply allowing their Arab brothers to return, but it has never served their interests to do so. Allowing the conflict to fester allows the Jews to serve as the scapegoats, a common enemy, and to distract the Arab people from their brutal and corrupt dictatorships. Egypt could end the suffering in Gaza today by simply opening the border but they still refuse to allow in any Palestinians.

Lack of courageous Arab leadership has plagued the peace process. One outlier who dared make peace was Anwar Sadat, who was quickly rewarded with 1/3 of all land owned by Israel, billions in US aid, and quick assassination by anti-peace fanatics. Despite the wars and thousands of terrorist attacks, courageous Israeli leaders, including Yitzhak Rabin and Ehud Barak, have repeatedly offered what were internationally agreed to be very generous terms for a two-state solution in the West Bank, Gaza and East Jerusalem. But there was no courage on the other side, certainly not from Yasir Arafat. Most Palestinians want peace and do not support terror, but violent, fanatic factions have seized control, squelched the majority, and fostered terrorism.

18 years ago, Israel withdrew from Gaza. There was no occupation. There was a ceasefire. Aid and

resources have poured into Gaza. Much of it has come from Israel in the form of electricity, water, food, fuel, technology, and jobs in Gaza and Israel (despite near constant terrorism). Instead of using the resources to build a brighter future for Gazans, Hamas has funneled them into its war machine. Hamas has broken the ceasefire many times since 2005 with unprovoked attacks culminating with the horrific massacres of October 7<sup>th</sup>. Israelis feel they have no choice left but to free Palestine from Hamas and hope that some day in the future a courageous Palestinian leader will be able to break the stranglehold of the fanatics and make peace.

My name is Andrew Santos. I live in Alameda, near Park and Central. I'm a member at Buena Vista United Methodist Church. I really enjoy living in Alameda, using the public beach, parks, dog parks, soccer fields and basketball courts. I will also be a new parent next year and look forward to my child growing up here. I love this community, and is part of why I am writing to you to urge you to support Mayor Ashcraft's letter calling for an immediate ceasefire in Gaza.

I have hope for the future of children living in Gaza, but the recent escalation of violence has resulted in tragic loss of life and widespread suffering for innocent Palestinian civilians. Please, we need our city council to take a stand for peace and humanitarian values, like they do for this community.

Ceasefire is a safety issue. The ongoing war in Palestine makes many of our community members less safe, including Palestinians, Arabs, Muslims, and Jews. In Alameda, our unofficial motto is "Everyone belongs here," yet we are hearing that Palestinian, Arab and Muslim community members are afraid of being doxxed or losing their jobs for attending events or speaking out in solidarity with Palestinians. It is clear that a lasting solution can only be achieved through diplomatic efforts and a commitment to dialogue. Our Congresswoman Barbara Lee has signed on to the congressional ceasefire resolution and was courageous in her disavowal of the war in Iraq. Endorsing a ceasefire in Alameda not only follows her leadership, but adds constituent weight to her position and adds our city to the growing list of municipalities taking a moral stand.

**Ceasefire is a local issue.** <u>US Campaign for Palestinian Rights</u> estimates that Alameda taxpayers give \$1,115,883 to fund Israel's violence against Palestinian people. Those tax dollars could be coming back into our community for needed

services. Additionally, Alameda is home to hundreds of union members and community members whose unions and community organizations have endorsed an immediate ceasefire.

#### Dear Mayor and City Council,

I was encouraged and heartened to read so many thoughtful, eloquent, and restrained letters others have already submitted explaining why the proposed letter "demanding" a ceasefire is harmful. I have tried to write my own and found it extremely difficult to exercise the restraint my fellow Jews exhibit in holding back the heartbreak and fury we are feeling, in order to dispassionately outline why and how such a letter does nothing to impact the conflict in Israel and Gaza, and serves only to stir up anti-Jewish sentiment here.

I will likely not be attending the January 2 City Council meeting. When my daughter attended preschool at the JCC in Berkeley from 2013-2016, I received occasional emails home notifying parents that there was another bomb threat this morning, the kids have been taken to the park down the street, and Berkeley Police are on-site investigating (are you aware that even prior to October 7, that's a normal experience for Jews in America?). I had hoped when we first moved to Alameda that things would be better here; I was quickly disabused of that idea (between windows smashed at Temple Israel and multiple incidents in the schools over the years). Until now, I have been largely able to shield my daughter from the anti-semitism in our community. There may be some poetry in the fact that this is the year, as she prepares to become a bat mitzvah this coming spring, that the Jewish adults in her life are no longer able to hide from her this piece of our lives. And yet the past three months have been a rude enough awakening for her that I don't have it in me to also explain to her why and how city council meetings nationwide have been devolving into hours of deranged anti-Jewish conspiracy-theory sessions; so I am sending my support from home to all those who will be showing up on Tuesday to oppose the resolution.

In addition to echoing the sentiments of others regarding the difficulty for Jews living in your community, the complexity of the conflict, and the emptiness of the proposed gesture, I also echo the request that the Council not pass any resolution weighing in on Middle Eastern conflicts or any other geopolitics. And if you do, then I ask that you also: call for an immediate ceasefire in Sudan, where over 10,000 civilians have been killed this year alone; demand an end to the destruction in Yemen, where over 300,000 civilians have been killed since Ansar Allah seized control in 2014; "implore our elected leaders to contribute to a swift and sustainable resolution to the crisis" in Syria, where over half a million have been killed under Bashar Al-Assad; and continue to pass such resolutions at each monthly meeting until all conflicts worldwide have been adequately addressed.

And if you do not pass regular resolutions condemning conflicts, wars, genocides, repressive regimes, and autocrats worldwide - and if virtue-signalling neophytes don't show up every month demanding that you do - then I ask you to consider why only this conflict deserves the level of attention that demonstrators, rioters, vandals, and city councils nationwide have given it; why only this conflict, which brings with it the opportunity to rally together to publicly denounce and attack Jews?

### Dear Mayor Ashcraft and City Council Members,

Rather than issuing statements on foreign affairs, please follow your charter for dealing with the welfare of the city. Calling for an immediate ceasefire (not a pause) in the Israel-Hamas war may sound like a noble cause but would instead empower Hamas and their supporters (most of the Palestinians) to regroup and resume their long-term aim to annihilate the State of Israel (please check the Hamas Charter, 1987).

There have been already 5 major ceasefire treaties with Hamas since they assumed ruling power in Gaza in 2006. An immediate ceasefire without bounding it to a permanent peace solution based on **two states for two peoples** will just lead to the next round of war with a higher number of killed civilians.

I clearly understand your goodwill in proposing a call for a ceasefire in Gaza, a document that is currently crafted with its acknowledged intention to be balanced, recognizing the suffering on both sides. The document also recognizes that the origin and catalyst of current hostilities is the brutal massacre performed by Hamas on October 7<sup>th</sup>, which violated and broke the previous ceasefire agreement. This is a remarkable and highly appreciated resolution improvement over similar resolutions adopted by some of your neighboring cities.

However, a call for a ceasefire, which is not bound to a permanent peace agreement based on two states, is just another support of the Palestinians and Hamas as their preferred political representative in pursuing their goal to wipe the State of Israel off the map, as evidenced below.

It is very humane, noble, and honorable to empathize with and feel the suffering of the Palestinian civilians. Unfortunately, many serve as human shields for Hamas' forces. It is important to realize that Hamas' 30-40 thousand members are all Palestinians, and the Palestinians are currently supporting Hamas' goal to eradicate Israel more than ever. Please read the two attached Palestinian Polls, performed after October 7<sup>th</sup> by two reputable Palestinian Survey Centers, located in Ramallah, West Bank. I summarize some of the data reported in the survey of the Palestinian Center for Policy and Survey Research on December 13, 2023, Opinion Poll #90; <a href="https://www.pcpsr.org/en/node/963">https://www.pcpsr.org/en/node/963</a>:

- 63% of the Palestinians (in the West Bank and Gaza) **support the continuation of an armed fight until ALL Palestine will be free** (from the River to the Sea).
- 72% of the Palestinians support **Hamas' attack on October 7<sup>th</sup> as the right move.**
- 65% of the Palestinians are **against Two States for Two People**.
- 70% of the Palestinians are **for only one Palestinian State**.
- 78% of the Palestinians would vote today for Hamas' Hanya as the

**Palestinian President**, in an election against Abbas, the current Palestinian Authority President.

In conclusion, a temporary ceasefire without a sincere push toward a real peace agreement between two peoples will just be used to prepare for the next round of a much more fatal war.
