Dear Mayor Ashcraft and Honorable Members of the Alameda City Council:

I am writing on behalf of the Physicians Committee for Responsible Medicine, a national nonprofit with 17,000 physician members and 900,000 total supporters, to urge you to reject the proposed lease for the medical device company Science Corp. on city property and to pursue a different tenant—one whose use of public land will benefit the community.

Science Corp.'s CEO Has a History of Using Monkeys in Debilitating, Deadly Experiments

Max Hodak, the founder and chief executive officer (CEO) of Science Corp., was the co-founder and, until May 2021, president of the brain-computer interface company Neuralink. Hodak started Neuralink with Elon Musk, and the company's experiments on monkeys at the University of California, Davis, from 2017 to 2020 became the source of public outcry when they were revealed by the Physicians Committee last year. Public records show that, during Hodak's leadership at Neuralink, monkeys subjected to invasive brain experiments suffered seizures, paralysis, bloody diarrhea, chronic infections, internal bleeding, and death. The animals also suffered severe psychological distress, demonstrated by frequent hair-pulling and self-harm.

On at least two occasions, Neuralink's lead neurosurgeon failed to follow the company's own research protocols when he used a toxic adhesive to close gaps in monkeys' skulls. One of those incidents caused a monkey, known as "Animal 21," to suffer from a lack of coordination and balance, partial paralysis in both legs, and such severe vomiting that she developed open sores in her

esophagus. Staff noted she was "gasping/retching" and "collapse[d] from exhaustion/fatigue." When they finally euthanized her, they found that blood had built up on the surface of her brain due to a "subdural hemorrhage."

You can find all publicly released records of the monkeys used during Hodak's 2017-2020 Neuralink tenure on <u>our website</u>.

The troubling details of Hodak's past work were detailed in a September 2023 WIRED exposé titled *The Gruesome Story of How Neuralink's Monkeys Actually Died*. The article details the story of a 6-year-old female rhesus macaque known only as "Animal 15":

Days after her implant surgery, she began to press her head against the floor for no apparent reason; a symptom of pain or infection, the records say. Staff observed that though she was uncomfortable, picking and pulling at her implant until it bled, she would often lie at the foot of her cage and spend time holding hands with her roommate.

Animal 15 began to lose coordination, and staff observed that she would shake uncontrollably when she saw lab workers. Her condition deteriorated for months until the staff finally euthanized her. A necropsy report indicates that she had bleeding in her brain and that the Neuralink implants left parts of her cerebral cortex "focally tattered."

In December 2022, Reuters <u>reported</u> that Neuralink was "under federal investigation for potential animal-welfare violations amid internal staff complaints that its animal testing is being rushed, causing needless suffering and death"—including incidents that took place during Hodak's leadership. One such incident, which appears to have taken place in 2021 prior to Hodak's departure, was as follows:

The mistakes leading to unnecessary animal deaths included one instance in 2021, when 25 out of 60 pigs in a study had devices that were the wrong size implanted in their heads, an error that could have been avoided with more preparation, according to a person with knowledge of the situation and company documents and communications reviewed by Reuters.

The mistake raised alarms among Neuralink's researchers. In May 2021, Viktor Kharazia, a scientist, wrote to colleagues that the mistake could be a "red flag" to FDA reviewers of the study, which the company planned to submit as part of its application to begin human trials. His colleagues agreed, and the experiment was repeated with 36 sheep, according to the person with knowledge of the situation. All the animals, both the pigs and the sheep, were killed after the procedures, the person said.

Due to his wealth and notoriety, Musk has received much of the public attention regarding Neuralink's failures, but Hodak was co-leading the company at the time of these incidents. Now, according to public filings, Hodak wants to use public property to conduct vision experiments on mice, rabbits, and "non-ape primates" (the latter of which presumably means *monkeys* since apes, such as chimpanzees, are no longer used in biomedical experiments in the United States).

Federal Oversight of Animal Experimentation at Alameda Point Would be Weak and Poorly Enforced

Despite its name, the federal Animal Welfare Act allows all forms of animal experiments—including those that inflict pain. The law—primarily a husbandry statute that regulates the size of cages, cleanliness, food, and water—covers fewer than five percent of animals used in laboratories. The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), which is supposed to enforce the law, was cited by its own inspector general for unjustifiably closing investigations involving animal deaths and serious repeat violations and for unnecessarily reducing fines by an average of 86%. And USDA's oversight appears to be getting even weaker. In 2022, Harvard Law School sued USDA for "offloading the burden of inspecting animal research sites to a private third party, resulting in a system that the lawsuit describes as largely self-policing and less rigorous."

In addition, USDA has a well-documented history of creating policies that wipe violations from publicly available records. One such policy allowed Neuralink to face no repercussions for twice failing to follow its own research protocols, as described above. As reported by <u>WIRED</u>, one of those failures, "regulators later acknowledged, was a violation of the U.S. Animal Welfare Act There would be no consequences, however."

Public filings related to the proposed lease for Science Corp. state that the company holds "permits and licenses from, and is annually inspected and reviewed by...[the] United States National Institute [sic] of Health and Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee." This is confusing and partially untrue. First, under federal law each research facility must appoint its own institutional animal care and use committee. This committee's work constitutes self-regulation, not independent governmental oversight. In addition, if a company using animals registers with the National Institutes of Health (NIH), the agency does not inspect the company—the agency merely requires the company to maintain a document called an "Animal Welfare Assurance." But Science Corp. is not listed in the NIH database of "Institutions with a PHS Approved Animal Welfare Assurance." Thus, there appears to be no oversight of the company by NIH.

Even if Science Corp. were registered with NIH, the agency's oversight of the conduct of animal experiments mostly takes the form of written recommendations, as opposed to fines or other punishments—even in cases of animal deaths or severe negligence. NIH does not conduct routine animal welfare inspections and would likely never visit the Alameda Point site to ensure compliance.

Although Science Corp. may have an internal institutional animal care and use committee, the committee likely provides little in the way of oversight. Such committees are designed to facilitate animal experiments and therefore are often stacked with animal experimenters. At private companies, significant conflicts of interest among committee members are unavoidable. A May 2023 Reuters report on Neuralink's internal committee found that it was "filled...with company insiders who may stand to benefit financially." The article continued, "Putting employees on such panels poses a particular problem at startups such as Neuralink because they tend to focus on a single breakthrough product and commonly reward employees with volatile company shares." (Just like Neuralink, Science Corp.'s work focuses on a single "breakthrough" product.) Thus, members of the committees have little incentive to potentially slow down animal experiments by asking questions or raising concerns. The article quoted Duke University neuroscientist and physician Dr. Miguel Nicolelis, who stated, "It's an obvious conflict of interest."

There Is No Need to Use Animals in Vision Research

Implanted devices like the one being developed by Science Corp. come with a myriad of problems, including difficulty of repair and a high potential for severe medical complications. In comparison, noninvasive treatments for vision loss minimize such risks. Ultrasound stimulation of the primary visual cortex has <u>shown promise</u> in human patients without "any adverse effects" for participants. A <u>2020 review</u> of noninvasive methods for vision recovery using electrical stimulation found

"conclusive evidence" that this method could be a viable treatment. Similarly, a 2021 study found improvements using noninvasive electrical brain stimulation in patients who had partially lost vision following strokes. Even stem cell therapies for retinal degeneration can be developed without the use of animals—using human-derived stem cells.

The failings of the use of animals in many areas of health research are well-documented. A <u>2014</u> <u>analysis</u> from Yale University School of Public Health epidemiologist Dr. Michael Bracken and others questioned whether animal experimentation is properly based on evidence. He wrote:

The current situation is unethical. Poorly designed studies and lack of methodological rigour in preclinical research may result in expensive but ultimately fruitless clinical trials that needlessly expose humans to potentially harmful drugs or may result in other potentially beneficial therapies being withheld. Moreover, if poorly conducted studies produce unreliable findings, any suffering endured by animals loses its moral justification because their use cannot possibly contribute towards clinical benefit. (emphasis added)

The analysis concluded that, due to the continued failures by researchers to conduct rigorous studies and by the studies to predict outcomes in humans, "the public's continuing endorsement and funding of preclinical animal research seems misplaced."

In 2012, Dr. John Ioannidis of Stanford University <u>wrote</u> that it is "nearly impossible to rely on most animal data to predict whether or not an intervention will have a favourable clinical benefit-risk ratio in human subjects."

Human populations have diverse biological and environmental features that impact health and disease and cannot be modeled in animals. Drs. Pandora Pound and Merel Ritskes-Hoitinga <u>argued</u> in 2018 in the *Journal of Translational Medicine* that poor validity of animal experiments cannot be overcome and that research should "focus instead on human-relevant research methods and technologies."

Increasingly, researchers are moving away from using animals for testing drugs and developing treatments. In 2022, the U.S. Congress passed legislation that many interpret to mean the FDA no longer must require the use of animals for preclinical drug testing. And more human-relevant *in vitro* models using cells from human organs and tissues are proving to effectively mimic the responses found in the human body.

Considering the public's <u>significant moral opposition</u> to the use of animals in experimentation, local governments should not encourage the practice. Instead, public funding and support should be directed to organizations, companies, and scientists working to overcome the failings of animal "models" and develop methods that humanize and modernize research.

Please Reject the Proposed Lease for Science Corp.

The City of Alameda can do much better when finding a tenant for the space at Alameda Point. That area should be a place for the public to use and enjoy, not for conducting painful, deadly, and scientifically unnecessary experiments on animals.

We respectfully request that you reject the proposed lease for Science Corp. and find a different tenant for the public space.



Dear Alameda City Council,

At Science, we are developing advanced medical devices for serious unmet medical needs. Our first program is the Science Eye retinal prosthesis for patients who suffer from profound blindness due to rod-cone dystrophies such as retinitis pigmentosa and dry macular degeneration. These patients watch their vision dwindle over years until only spots of light are left, which today is completely irreversible.

There have been prior commercial attempts at visual prostheses, but none with the potential to achieve single-neuron resolution, which is necessary to restore high-resolution vision to the brain. We hope to offer patients who have spent many years in darkness the ability to see their childrens' faces again, or the independence to walk across town on their own to buy coffee.

Our therapies, alongside every other medical device and drug from pacemakers to paxlovid, require animal research as mandated by the FDA and regulated by the USDA. While recent legislation allows the FDA to consider evidence other than animal studies, FDA reviewers and consultants have significant discretion in what they ask for, and they have told us through formal feedback that they require animal studies in order to seek approval for a first-in-human clinical trial in the US.

The FDA Modernization Act cites a range of new tools, including induced pluripotent stem cells, artificial intelligence, and organoid technologies as alternatives to animal studies. We use all of these, but unfortunately they are only a partial substitute. This is fundamentally a scientific technical limitation: in an ideal world no animal testing would be required, but today there is no other source of the critical safety and efficacy data used to justify risking a human patient, requirements imposed by federal regulators. Personally, I believe there are often opportunities that make sense to go into human patients earlier than we do today, and would love to discuss FDA reform with anyone who will hear me, but on our path to reaching patients today this is not our call to make.

The species we use and the number of each is based on a dialog with those regulators. For example, whether we can use only rabbits or if some primate studies will be required is an active topic of discussion between our regulatory team and the FDA. If primate studies are required, it is possible we could do them elsewhere than Alameda Point.

With the complexity of our studies, it is not feasible to outsource them. Our vertical integration, where our electrical engineers are only a few steps from our surgeons and our stem cell biologists, is a key element of why we have been able to move as fast as we have in our two years of existence. Dividing the company would result in higher costs and longer timelines to reach patients, potentially even lowering the chance it reaches them at all.

The medicines we develop involve gene and cell therapies, and if they reach patients will be among the most complex pieces of biotechnology to ever reach the clinic. The assertions by PCRM that there are alternatives which don't require testing, such as focused ultrasound or non-invasive electrical stimulation are not rooted in reality. If there were a non-invasive, wearable device that could be built to restore vision to patients, believe me, we would be building that instead. I have a family history of retinitis pigmentosa and grew up around it. It is hurtful for these groups to simply hand-wave away potential progress citing other technologies they do not understand which do not in fact work in the way they are suggesting.

As for the Neuralink allegations, I really cannot speak for them, as I am still under NDA from my time there. But I will say the recent pressure campaign coverage is a heavy mischaracterization of the facts. I know the Neuralink animal care team cares deeply about animal welfare and follows standards far in excess of traditional guidelines. Not many companies try to retire animals to sanctuary, but Neuralink has invested in doing just that when appropriate. Further, per public information, all of the records cited by PCRM are from the California National Primate Research Center at UC Davis under protocols approved by their Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee. All of that work was reviewed and monitored by a panel of UC Davis faculty per field-standards. Further, the 2021 pig study they reference happened after I had left the company, and I had no part in its design or implementation; all I know about it is from news articles.

At Science we are developing very different technology than Neuralink, and accordingly the species we have to use are different. Regardless, we commit to following the same high standards as evidenced in those blog posts, and doing what we can to give our research animals exceptional housing conditions and empower our vet med staff to provide the best possible care. All of this is regulated by the US Department of Agriculture, whose reports are public records, and who make unannounced inspections at least once a year in addition to responding to complaints.

The Science Eye is the first in a range of devices we plan to announce over the coming years, each focused on a different critical unmet medical need. More is possible than many believe today, and I am confident that the coming years are going to be surprising. We feel a deep moral obligation to bring these innovations to patients who can benefit from them the most.

Due to the nature of our operations, it is difficult to keep moving the company every few years as we outgrow facilities. Animal research is only a small part of what we do: the rest of the company needs highly-rated cleanrooms and extensive technical infrastructure. Moving all of this is extremely disruptive and complex. Our goal is to put down roots and spend the next several decades investing in our community and growing to be valuable members of the Alameda Point community. I have spent several

years searching the Bay Area for this home, and we have no runner up. I am convinced that Alameda Point will be a highlight of the whole Bay Area by the end of this decade. We would love to be part of that as we work towards bringing these important therapies to patients.

Dear Mayor Ashcraft and Honorable Members of the Alameda City Council:

A national medical ethics group is urging the Alameda City Council to reject a proposed lease for a medical device company whose CEO previously oversaw debilitating, deadly experiments on monkeys. The company, Science Corp., has applied to occupy Building 11 at Alameda Point, public property owned by the city, where it plans to conduct experiments on primates, rabbits, and mice. Its CEO, Max Hodak, was the co-founder and, until May 2021, president of the brain-computer interface company Neuralink. Hodak started Neuralink with Elon Musk, and the company's experiments on monkeys at the University of California, Davis, from 2017 to 2020 caused public outcry when they were revealed last year by the nonprofit Physicians Committee for Responsible Medicine. In a letter sent Saturday, the Physicians Committee asked the city council to "pursue a different tenant—one whose use of public land will benefit the community." The council will vote on the proposal during a public meeting on Oct. 17 at 7:00 p.m.

Public records show that, during Hodak's leadership at Neuralink, monkeys subjected to invasive brain experiments suffered seizures, paralysis, bloody diarrhea, chronic infections, internal bleeding, and death. The animals also suffered severe psychological distress, demonstrated by frequent hair-pulling and self-harm.

On at least two occasions, Neuralink's lead neurosurgeon failed to follow the company's own research protocols when he used a toxic adhesive to close gaps in monkeys' skulls. One of those incidents caused a monkey, known as "Animal 21," to suffer from a lack of coordination and balance, partial paralysis in both legs, and such severe vomiting that she developed open sores in her esophagus. Staff noted she was "gasping/retching" and "collapse[d] from exhaustion/fatigue." When Neuralink finally euthanized her, staff found that blood had built up on the surface of her brain due to a "subdural hemorrhage."

In December 2022, Reuters reported that Neuralink was "under federal investigation for potential animal-welfare violations amid internal staff complaints that its animal testing is being rushed, causing needless suffering and death"—including incidents that took place during Hodak's leadership.

Local governments should not hand over public land to companies likely to engage in unethical, scientifically questionable animal experiments. If Alameda city leaders want to support research, they should encourage the use of

human-relevant methods that can benefit patients.

In its letter to the city council, the Physicians Committee pointed out that implanted devices like the one being developed by Science Corp. come with a myriad of problems, including difficulty of repair and a high potential for severe medical complications. In comparison, noninvasive treatments for vision loss minimize such risks. The letter emphasized that ultrasound stimulation of the primary visual cortex has shown promise in human patients without "any adverse effects" for participants. In addition, a 2020 review of noninvasive methods for vision recovery using electrical stimulation found "conclusive evidence" that this method could be a viable treatment. Even stem cell therapies for retinal degeneration can be developed without the use of animals.

A Science corporation

September 2021

Long story short, a couple friends and I — our unifying trait being persistent optimism that with the best possible tools and minimal red tape, more things are possible than most people realize — have started a new company, which we've named Science.

I explain a bit about what we're up to below, and if these kinds of challenges are interesting to you, please consider coming to work with us!

It's pretty shocking how much better life science tools have become over the last decade or so. I mean seriously, just look at this:

Fly Hemibrain Overview, HHMI & Google

Multi-beam FIB-SEMs basically enable direct digitization of blocks of matter at single-digit nanometer resolution, enabling us to "scan" tissue and automatically reconstruct the dense anatomy using deep learning. We've gone from microarrays to spatial transcriptomics. We can directly visualize single Cas9 molecules cutting a molecule of DNA using high speed atomic force microcopy. More scalably, single-molecule localization microscopy using off-the-shelf superresolution confocals is now becoming widely available. In 2000 we had GCaMP, and now we have compartment-localizable ultrafast voltage indicators and light beads microscopy.

Consider the following interpretation of the dichotomy between *science* and *engineering*: if you can directly see and manipulate the things you're dealing with, you're doing engineering, and if not — you need to ask clever indirect questions to get at what you're really interested in — you're doing science.

Because of this intervening cleverness, science is "hard" and often advances serendipitously, but improving technology has steadily transferred more and more content from the realm of science to the realm of engineering, just as similar progress produced a conveyor belt from natural philosophy to modern science during the Enlightenment.

Probably to no great surprise, "Track 1" at Science is Neural Engineering. Specifically, our initial focus is on the cranial nerves, using some exciting ideas we think are promising that, while definitely known in the literature, don't seem to have caught on yet. This scope reduction yields a much simpler set of problems to solve, as the general problem of BCI is tough and bordered on all sides by imposing physics barriers, while still enabling some pretty dramatic products.

To understand this plan, it's important to see the divergence in the goals of neuroscience overall and the sub-field of brain-machine interfaces in particular.

At the highest level, neuroscience is concerned with understanding the structure and function of brains: what they are and how they work. In this pursuit, you find yourself asking questions along the lines of "how does this particular circuit in the hippocampus underlie the formation of memories?" or "how do varying levels of protein expression in the accumbens relate to addictive behaviors?" or the

like. To answer these questions, you need to get *inside* the brain to where these phenomena are happening and there's no way around it — peering into the brain is in some sense the whole game.

Naturally, the field of neuroscience has produced a wide variety of tools for observing things happening inside the brain. This is where brain-machine interfacing comes in: if we can record or drive neural activity, maybe we can connect the brain to external systems. But the goal of brain-machine interfacing isn't *necessarily* to understand the brain, at least not any more than required to add I/O channels. Brain-machine interfacing inherited a roadmap from neuroscience, because the field came out of neuroscience, but ultimately these are different endeavors.

While it's extraordinarily difficult to reach into the brain, all of the information that flows in or out goes through only a handful of nerves in the head and spine. These form the complete "API" of the body: if you can connect to them with single-unit resolution — still extremely difficult — you can provide exactly the same senses and motor surface that your nose, eyes, ears, hands and so on do.

Crucially, you don't need to place anything into the parenchyma, the sensitive bulk tissue, to do this. It's not "non-invasive," but there are early products on this road that should have a safety profile approaching true mass-market consumer devices, and others may be able to do some truly wild things for patients with few alternatives. The future isn't better smartphones or AR glasses: it's making the sensorium itself directly programmable, and maybe even adding new senses entirely.

To be clear, these are aspirations. I'm not saying we have some secret device behind the curtain you should be hyped about. What I am saying is that this is technically possible to do, and we should do it. We've raised the money to get started — actually significantly more than what's been publicly reported, but that's the wrong thing to focus on — and now we have to go make things. We believe we have a clear view through to a first big defining product, built on an overlooked technical approach that hopefully we can deliver to patients in a timely manner.

As for Neuralink, I was being genuine when I said that I learned a ton there and remain significantly invested in their success. Going forward, though we both work with the brain, our goals are different: Science is not working on products that will likely be very useful for merging with AI, though that is a mission in which I hope Neuralink is successful. From a technology standpoint, what we are pursuing at Science is quite different.

A Science corporation

September 2021

Long story short, a couple friends and I — our unifying trait being persistent optimism that with the best possible tools and minimal red tape, more things are possible than most people realize — have started a new company, which we've named Science.

I explain a bit about what we're up to below, and if these kinds of challenges are interesting to you, please consider coming to work with us!

It's pretty shocking how much better life science tools have become over the last decade or so. I mean seriously, just look at this:

Fly Hemibrain Overview, HHMI & Google

Multi-beam FIB-SEMs basically enable direct digitization of blocks of matter at single-digit nanometer resolution, enabling us to "scan" tissue and automatically reconstruct the dense anatomy using deep learning. We've gone from microarrays to spatial transcriptomics. We can directly visualize single Cas9 molecules cutting a molecule of DNA using high speed atomic force microcopy. More scalably, single-molecule localization microscopy using off-the-shelf superresolution confocals is now becoming widely available. In 2000 we had GCaMP, and now we have compartment-localizable ultrafast voltage indicators and light beads microscopy.

Consider the following interpretation of the dichotomy between science and engineering: if you can directly see and manipulate the things you're dealing with, you're doing engineering, and if not — you need to ask clever indirect questions to get at what you're really interested in — you're doing science.

Because of this intervening cleverness, science is "hard" and often advances serendipitously, but improving technology has steadily transferred more and more content from the realm of science to the realm of engineering, just as similar progress produced a conveyor belt from natural philosophy to modern science during the Enlightenment.

Probably to no great surprise, "Track 1" at Science is Neural Engineering. Specifically, our initial focus is on the cranial nerves, using some exciting ideas we think are promising that, while definitely known in the literature, don't seem to have caught on yet. This scope reduction yields a much simpler set of problems to solve, as the general problem of BCI is tough and bordered on all sides by imposing physics barriers, while still enabling some pretty dramatic products.

To understand this plan, it's important to see the divergence in the goals of neuroscience overall and the sub-field of brain-machine interfaces in particular.

At the highest level, neuroscience is concerned with understanding the structure and function of brains: what they are and how they work. In this pursuit, you find yourself asking questions along the lines of "how does this particular circuit in the hippocampus underlie the formation of

memories?" or "how do varying levels of protein expression in the accumbens relate to addictive behaviors?" or the like. To answer these questions, you need to get inside the brain to where these phenomena are happening and there's no way around it — peering into the brain is in some sense the whole game.

Naturally, the field of neuroscience has produced a wide variety of tools for observing things happening inside the brain. This is where brain-machine interfacing comes in: if we can record or drive neural activity, maybe we can connect the brain to external systems. But the goal of brain-machine interfacing isn't necessarily to understand the brain, at least not any more than required to add I/O channels. Brain-machine interfacing inherited a roadmap from neuroscience, because the field came out of neuroscience, but ultimately these are different endeavors.

While it's extraordinarily difficult to reach into the brain, all of the information that flows in or out goes through only a handful of nerves in the head and spine. These form the complete "API" of the body: if you can connect to them with single-unit resolution — still extremely difficult — you can provide exactly the same senses and motor surface that your nose, eyes, ears, hands and so on do.

Crucially, you don't need to place anything into the parenchyma, the sensitive bulk tissue, to do this. It's not "non-invasive," but there are early products on this road that should have a safety profile approaching true mass-market consumer devices, and others may be able to do some truly wild things for patients with few alternatives. The future isn't better smartphones or AR glasses: it's making the sensorium itself directly programmable, and maybe even adding new senses entirely.

To be clear, these are aspirations. I'm not saying we have some secret device behind the curtain you should be hyped about. What I am saying is that this is technically possible to do, and we should do it. We've raised the money to get started — actually significantly more than what's been publicly reported, but that's the wrong thing to focus on — and now we have to go make things. We believe we have a clear view through to a first big defining product, built on an overlooked technical approach that hopefully we can deliver to patients in a timely manner.

VOTE NO on 7-B: Lease for Science Corp.

Dear Mayor Ashcraft and Members of the Alameda City Council,

The East Bay Animal PAC urges you to REJECT the proposed lease for Science Corp.(Item 7-B).

Science Corp. was founded and is run by Max Hodak, who co-founded and served as president of Elon Musk's company Neuralink which subjected monkeys to invasive brain experiments, causing seizures, paralysis, chronic infections, internal bleeding, and death.

The details of Hodak's past work were detailed in a recent WIRED exposé titled "The Gruesome Story of How Neuralink's Monkeys Actually Died." According to the article, "UC Davis veterinary records cited by the Physicians Committee—which WIRED also obtained through a subsequent California public records request—chronicle a battery of complications that developed following procedures involving electrodes being surgically implanted into monkeys' brains. The complications include bloody diarrhea, partial paralysis, and cerebral edema, a condition colloquially known as "brain swelling."

The City of Alameda should not provide a lease of public land to anyone with a history of questionable and unethical practices related to primate testing.
