How can the City of Alameda Better Engage Youth in Climate Action?

- Focus on students that are already involved in climate work as well as reaching out to those who are not yet.
- Work towards getting more students educated, interested, and participating in climate action in Alameda.
- Two pathways achieve this goal:
 - Climate Interested Youth: Collaborating with and supporting climate interested youth, and student-led organizations.
 - Non-Climate Aware Youth: Work with climate interested youths to spread the passion for climate action, engaging and educating students who would otherwise not participate.

Engaging Climate Interested Alameda Youth

Develop a Youth Climate Ambassador Program to work with student-based climate groups (EHS Environmental cooperative, AHS Amplify, ASTI Activism, Lincoln Environmental Club, YouthPower, etc.)

- Creating a network of students in climate action
- Students learn about the city's actions and CARP initiatives
- Implement the information they've learned to their own student populations


Educational Opportunities

 - · Student made CARP video




Student Community Service Survey
