- 2. .308 ammo for training
- 3. 40mm sponge rounds
- 4. The use of drone technology for critical incidents, sideshow management and traffic collision roadway mapping



Overview and Benefits of Drones

- Drones allow APD to collect evidence about critical incidents, including sideshows for strategic intervention and enforcement without jeopardizing safety of officers and escalating dangerous situations
- Request is for two drones, along with adoption of an operations policy with strong privacy protections
- Easy and fast to deploy; less expensive and more efficient than other aerial technology; two-way voice and visual communication



Proposed Drone Operations Policy

Allowed Use of Drones, such as:

 Life preservation missions
 All felony crimes
 Unpermitted car shows
 Riots
 Mass Casualty events
 Missing persons
 Rescue events
 Disaster response and recovery

Authorized Personnel – only authorized operators with training

Post-incident documentation

Approval and Oversight – Supervisor must approve deployment

- Prohibited Use
 No weaponization
 No facial recognition
 No random surveillance
 No targeting of a person based on actual or perceived characteristics
 No harassment or intimidation
 No personal business
- Published policy on April 15th and held community meeting on April 30th
- Consulted with community, Secure Justice, ACLU best practices and business community Updated policy based on Council feedback from May 7th

Recommendation

- 1. Accept Annual Military Equipment Report for APD;
- 2. Introduction of Ordinance adopting a military equipment use policy for drones; and
- Authorize City Manager to purchase two drones from Axon Enterprise for a not-to-exceed amount of \$143,804.02 over a term of five years.
