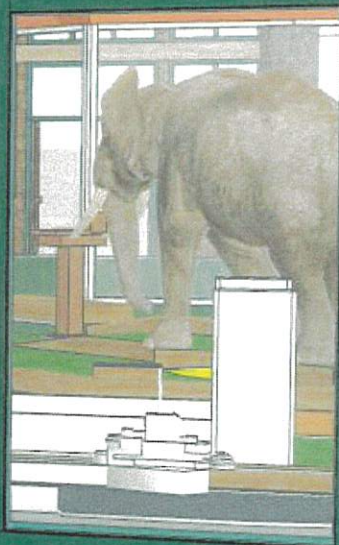


A HISTORY OF FUN IN ALAMEDA

Neptune Beach in Alameda was once a premier attraction to the island, located where Crab Cove is now. Alameda boasted one of the great amusement parks from 1897 until 1939.

Dubbed the "Coney Island of the West," Neptune Beach was home to a large beachfront area, an Olympic-sized swimming pool, a hand-carved Carousel, a Ferris Wheel, and two Roller Coasters: the "Whoopee" and the "Safety Racer" both recreated here.

Home to the American debut of the Snow Cone, and the popularity, as well as a site for demonstrations from the famous Johnny Weissmuller and Jack LaLanne, Neptune Beach was nothing short of iconic, and set the standard for amusement on the island city.

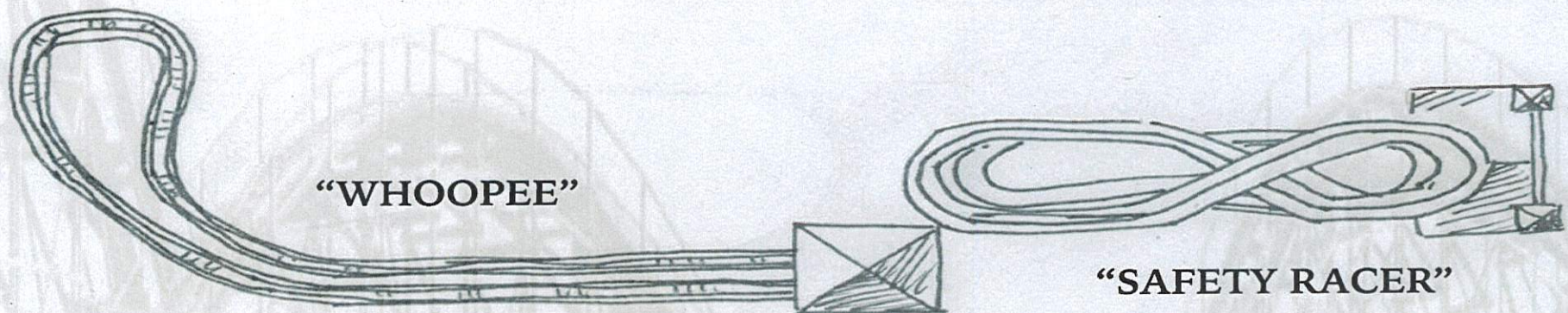
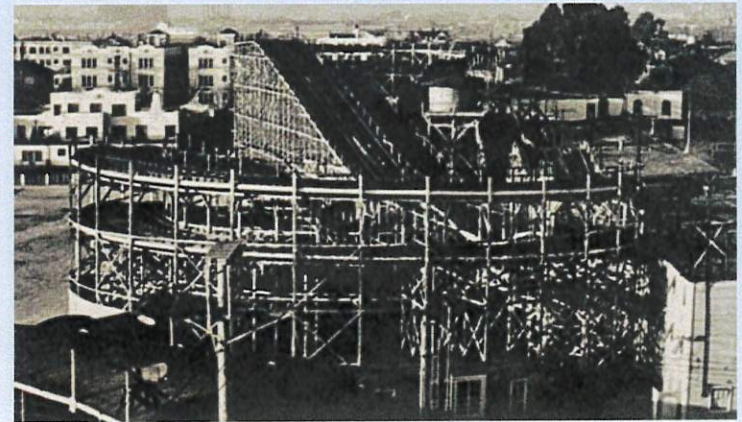
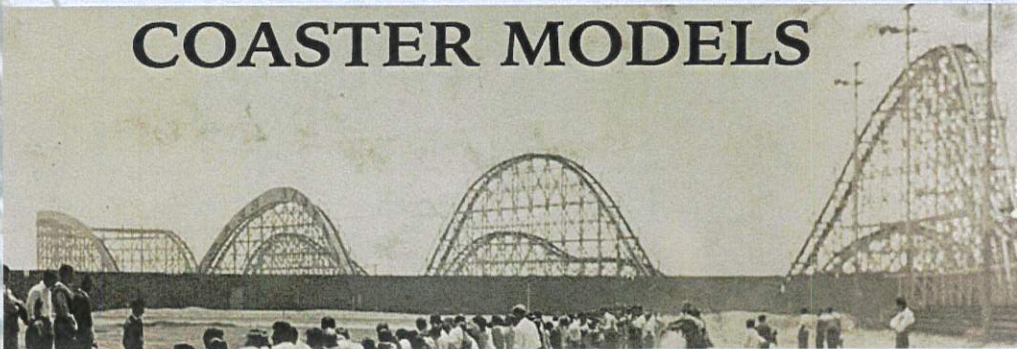

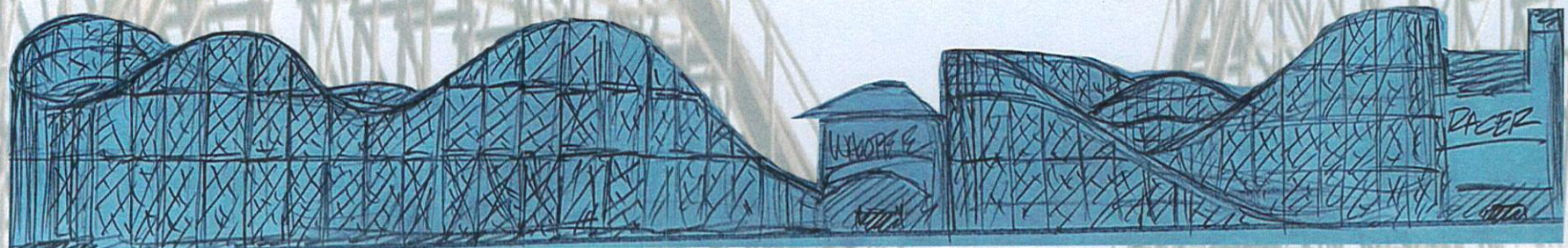
