- **Whereas**, this year's theme, "Unidos: Inclusivity for a Stronger Nation," encourages us to ensure that all voices are represented and welcomed to help build stronger communities and a stronger nation, and reminds us of our common goals as we work toward a more inclusive, equitable society in Alameda, where everyone belongs here; and
- **Whereas**, diversity is strength, and we must do the work to achieve a brighter, more equitable future. We honor the resilience of Latino and Hispanic communities who have persisted through centuries of discrimination to lead movements for justice and equality. As labor leader and civil rights activist Dolores Huerta said, "The leaders come up from the volunteers that do the work, and it's amazing because then they do these incredible things in their community that they never thought they had the power to make happen;" and
