BACKGROUND

- City Council approved \$75,000 in FT 2021-23
- Existing dog parks at Washington Park and Main Street
- New dog park (large and small) coming at Estuary Park Phase II in 2024
- Commission reviewed survey results and multiple locations in September and December 2021 plus January 2022.

Benefits of a Dog Park

- According to American Kennel Club:
- Allows dogs to exercise and socialize safely
- Promotes responsible ownership by keeping them in an appropriate area
- Provides outlet for dog owners to socialize
- Creates community and promotes public health and safety (wellexercised dogs are better neighbors)

Dog Park Design Standards

- One acre (43,560 sq ft) or more of land with 4 to 6-foot high fence
 - Many dog parks in urban areas are significantly smaller
- Double-gated entry
- Ideally separate large and small dog areas
- Appropriate signage, parking and amenities
