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I am writing to express my strong support for the Oakland Alameda Multi-Hazard Adaptation and Community Benefits Project being submitted for the Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC) 2023 grant. This BRIC grant covers the Oakland International Airport, Oakland's Columbian Gardens neighborhood and Alameda's Bay Farm Island northern shoreline neighborhood, which are vulnerable to flooding and are hydraulically linked. With future sea level rise, a majority of the project area is expected to be inundated by daily tides.
