Getting a group of citizens, a committee of some kind, to look into the benefits of adding council members to city council, then make recommendations, can easily be arranged to come up with whatever Councilman Daysog wishes to hear in the findings. Right? Not satisfactory to me and especially since there has been no call from the public for additional council members.

Everyone is well aware that there is very limited time for the public to share their thoughts during council sessions. And when *many* people wish to comment on a matter, rules instruct that public comment be reduced. Add additional members, and each one will wish to expound on their position and ask their questions; the time for the public to speak is bound to be cut further.

And the meetings will doubtless last longer. Already many, many residents are unable to attend full meetings because these go on too late into the night.

I do not buy Tony's argument to me that additional council members will ensure that the public has easier access to city hall. And as for Tony's argument that more council members make sense, to share the responsibility for decision making around the city's large budget, isn't this what he and the rest of the council signed up for? Isn't it city staff that are in fact the professionals, do the research and make well-informed recommendations on all the high dollar budget items?

How do any of these predictable outcomes work to build democracy at city level? Red flags are up for me.
