The City of Alameda is writing you in support of the Building Homes and Jobs Act, AB 1335.

The Building Homes and Jobs Act creates an ongoing funding source that helps the state live within its means. The act imposes a \$75 fee on documents related to real-estate transactions, excluding home/commercial property sales.
