



FUTURE DIRECTIONS

- A recently commissioned independent community survey 9 Conducted in February 2018 by EMC Research)by the Peralta Community College District shows residents view each of the four District colleges – Laney College, Merritt College, Berkeley City College, and College of Alameda very favorably.
- Nearly 60% indicated there is at least some need for additional funding.
- 69% indicated potential support for a local bond to address aging classrooms and science labs, and to expand job-training classrooms.
- 85% expressed potential support to renew the existing voter-approved parcel tax with no increase to continue educational programs that prepare students for university transfer and career, and support an affordable college education

CURRENT FACILITIES STATUS

- Educational needs and priorities identified by the community and Facilities Master Plan to date:
 - Repair or replace leaky roofs
 - Improve access to college facilities for people with disabilities
 - Replace aging, seismically unsafe buildings and facilities
