RE: Summary of Neighbor Outreach for FAAS North Loop Project

DATE: January 9, 2020

In addition to the city's official process for public notification, Friends of the Alameda Animal Shelter (FAAS) undertook a proactive outreach effort to connect with the neighbors of our proposed Community and Adoption Center at Harbor Bay Business Park. Below is a summary timeline with key activities.

On **June 26th**, **2018** FAAS mailed letters to the owners of record for the five residential properties on Ratto Rd that directly border our property at 2331 North Loop Rd. (Please see example, Attachment 1).

In the letter, we stated the following:

Most important to all of us at FAAS is being a good neighbor, both to the other organizations that reside in the business park as well as our residential neighbors. To that end, I would like to see if we could schedule an in-person meeting to discuss our vision for the new Community Center and get your feedback on this exciting project. We are early in the planning stage, and your voice will be critical in helping us design a FAAS Community Center that will make a big impact for the people of Alameda.

As follow-up and an attempt to have face-to-face meetings, on **July 20, 2018**, FAAS executive director, John L. Lipp, and FAAS board member, Jim Moore, knocked on the doors of the five houses who were mailed personal letters. Below is a summary of our meetings:

305 Ratto Rd. - Mr. Michael Manushaw and Ms. Carolyn Cozart

John and Jim had a very positive discussion with Mr. Manushaw. He stated that he and his wife Carolyn adopted from FAAS in the past and were donors. He was very supportive of the new Community Center proposal and joked that "nothing could be as noisy as the day care." We gave him a copy of the Neighborhood Outreach package. (Please see example - Attachment 2). He was going to have his wife call me if she had any feedback. On July 23, 2018 Ms. Cozart did call and was very supportive of the project.

309 Ratto Rd. - No one was home, so we left a business card asking for a call to discuss the project.

315 Ratto Rd.

We talked w/ a man who self-identified as the owner. He was very nice and appreciative that we were reaching out. He seemed supportive and the only issue he identified is the possible noise. We explained the design concept and our plans to minimize noise. He seemed to appreciate that it was a priority for us as well. We gave him a copy of the Neighborhood Outreach package and encouraged him to call if he had any questions.

321 Ratto Rd - No one was home, so we left a business card asking for a call to discuss the project.

327 Ratto Rd

The current occupant appeared in the process of moving out. We chatted briefly with her and she asked for a business card. On **July 24, 2018**, FAAS board president, Nancy Evans, attended the broker's open house for 327 Ratto Road and disclosed the plans for FAAS North Loop to the listing agent, Ringo Liu of Keller Williams.

During this same period and into 2019, John Lipp actively reached out to Theresa Magabo, director of Bright Horizons school, and requested a meeting to discuss the project and possible collaborations. This outreach included leaving messages and an in-person visit to the school. There were no return calls.

With no feedback from the neighbors, either through our own outreach efforts or in response to the City of Alameda's notifications to neighbors within 300 feet of the site, online postings, and ads, FAAS continued to work on the design and planning for our proposed Community and Adoption Center. Our architects and planning team worked closely with the City's Planning Department to ensure we were following all the rules to create a community and adoption center that would be a true amenity to the business park and surrounding community.

On **February 22nd, 2019** the Architectural Review Committee for the Harbor Bay Business Park Association reviewed and approved the plans for the proposed project.

No one from the public showed up to comment on the project when it was unanimously approved by the Planning Board on **June 10**th, **2019** or when the Zoning Text Amendment was subsequently approved by the City Council on **July 16**th, **2019**.

With participation from FAAS, on **August 6, 2019** the East Bay Times ran an online article on the project and subsequently reprinted the article on the front page of August 9th edition of the Alameda Journal.

On **August 8, 2019**, in response to a posting on Next Door/Harbor Bay Isle about the East Bay Times article, John shared to following post:

Hi everyone, it's John L. Lipp, Executive Director of FAAS. Huge thanks to Ophelia for posting this message for me as it was only sent to members of the Harbor Bay Isle neighborhood. The article in the East Bay Times about our new Community and Adoption Center on North Loop was very nice and the outpouring of support has been incredibly gratifying. At the same time, the article didn't quite capture the broader vision and planning behind the project, including the fact that it will greatly increase the quality of care we are able to provide our animals while helping us adopt more animals in less time. I am going to host a community meeting on Monday, August 19th, 6:00pm at FAAS South Shore – our new cat adoption center at South Shore Shopping Center; right next to Charming Charley. This will give me a chance to provide more details about the project, get feedback, and answer questions. (I will be glad to do more community meetings if someone wants to host!) On **Monday, August 19th, 2019** John hosted the meeting at FAAS's satellite adoption center at South Shore. Five people attended, including CJ Jiang. At the end of the meeting, everyone indicated they were excited and supportive of the project.

On **Oct 15th, 2019** Mr. Stanley Layson, who had initially been made aware of the FAAS North Loop project in June of 2018, began posting on Next Door/Harbor Bay Isle about the project. On October 17th, John asked a member of the Harbor Bay Isle Next Door group to send a message to Mr. Layson asking him to call directly so they could address any concerns Mr. Layson had about the project. Mr. Layson never responded.


Following the City's administrative hearing on **Oct 21**st, **2019** in which Mr. and Mrs. Layson and CJ Jiang showed up to voice concern about the project, FAAS agreed to meet with them to address any misunderstandings or concerns about the project. On Oct. 30th, CJ Jiang hosted a meeting at her home at 256 Ratto Rd. Approximately 13 people, invited by Ms. Jiang, attended the meeting in which John Lipp and Jim Moore discussed the project in detail and listened to feedback. Subsequent e-mails suggested a follow-up meeting in January 2020 to discuss the possibility of enhanced landscaping along the fence line, and the opportunity to continue working jointly before and during the building permit process. FAAS also offered to meet individually with any of the owners on the joint property line to further discuss the project. To date, none have responded.

On **December 4, 2019** John had a positive meeting with Scott Mclease, the new owner of Bright Horizons school and Theresa Magabo, the school's director to discuss the project. On **December 19**th, **2019** John had another positive meeting with Eric Downey, Site Services Manager at Abbott Diabetes, FAAS's newest neighbor at the business park in the adjoining property previously owned by VF Outdoor.







EXISTING SITE CONDITIONS


