Resources for Workers Impacted by COVID-19

- **Paid Sick Leave**: <u>Please click here</u> for information on the use of Paid Sick Leave related to COVID-19. Note that paid sick leave may be used for illness, treatment, and preventative care (i.e. self-quarantine).
- Sick or Quarantined Workers: Sick or quarantined workers may be eligible to file for State Disability Insurance, with benefits ranging from 60-70 percent of wages (depending on income) and from \$50-\$1,300 a week. <u>Please click here</u> for more information.
- **Caregivers**: Workers caring for an ill or quarantined family member *may* be able to file for up to six weeks of Paid Family Leave. Benefit amounts are approximately 60-70 percent of wages (depending on income) and range from \$50-\$1,300 a week. <u>Please click here</u> for more information.
- **Reduced Hours or Layoffs**: Workers whose hours have been reduced or who have been laid off due to COVID-19 may be able to file for Unemployment Insurance (UI). UI provides partial wage replacement benefit payments to workers who lose their job or have their hours reduced, through no fault of their own. <u>Please click here</u> for more information.
- School Closures: Workers who miss work to care for a child who is not ill, but home due to a school closure, may be eligible for Unemployment Insurance. Resources for Employers Impacted by COVID-19

- **Tax Assistance:** Employers may request up to a 60-day extension from the EDD to file state payroll reports and/or deposit payroll taxes without penalty or interest. A written request for extension must be received within 60 days from the original delinquent date of the payment or return. Employers may call the EDD Taxpayer Assistance Center for more information at 1-888-745-3886.
- **Reduced Work Hours**: Employers can apply for the Unemployment Insurance (UI) Work Sharing Program if reduced production, services, or other conditions cause them to seek an alternative to layoffs. The Work Sharing Program helps employers and employees:
 - Minimize or eliminate the need for layoffs
 - Keep trained employees and quickly prepare when business conditions improve
 - Avoid the cost of recruiting, hiring, and training new employees
 - Receive Unemployment Insurance (UI) benefits
 - Keep their current job
 - Avoid financial hardships

General Business Recommendations

The California Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development (GO-Biz) suggested that businesses take the following approach with COVID-19:

- Postpone rather than cancel events—the State has emphasized that the public health advisories are very fluid, with the situation changing daily with new factual information. To minimize disruptions, businesses and community organizations may decide to postpone instead of cancel major events.
- 2) As with general good business practices to help manage economic volatility and uncertainty, the State recommends that businesses develop a range of scenarios to help with planning future operations. These scenarios can be adjusted as more current information becomes available.
