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Vision Zero defined

Vision Zero is an international movement that provides a framework for reducing traffic deaths and life-changing injuries to zero, while increasing safe, healthy, equitable mobility for all.













Alameda Vision Zero Policy

- Eliminate traffic deaths and severe injuries
- Safety = highest priority
- Vision Zero Action Plan
- Vision Zero Task Force
- Equitable implementation

- Measurable actions to increase street safety
- Five year plan
- Guided by Vision Zero Task Force
- Informed by Committee on Police Reform

Action Plan Goals

- 1. Ensure that the Vision Zero Policy and Action Plan are implemented equitably and fairly for all people.
- 2. Create an institutional commitment to Vision Zero throughout City government.
- 3. Foster community support and responsibility for the safety of people traveling within Alameda.
- 4. Reduce motor vehicle speeds and decrease collisions between people driving, riding a motorcycle, biking, walking, or wheeling.
- 5. Improve the use, collection, and organization of data to allow for evaluation and reporting that fosters transparency and creates trust with all stakeholders and residents.

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Vision Zero Action Plan Timeline

- July: Release draft plan
- July/August: Public input on draft
- September: Transportation Commission
- November or December: City Council





Crash data analysis findings

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What did we analyze?

- Police-reported crashes 2009-2018
- Limitation: some crashes not reported
- Only injury crashes (no property-damage-only crashes)



Traffic fatalities & injuries

Average per year

- 2 people die
- 10 severe injuries
- 221 total injuries



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


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Disproportionate impacts

- Younger (10-24) and older (65-84) people overrepresented in severe and fatal crashes.
- Pedestrians and bicyclists
 - 39% of Alameda's crashes
 - 62% of deaths and severe injuries





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


Top dangerous behaviors: fatal and severe injury crashes FAILURE TO YIELD UNSAFE SPEEDS FAILURE TO YIELD TO PEDESTRIAN FAILURE TO PEDESTRIAN FAILURE

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Crashes at intersections



- Most crashes were at unsignalized intersections
- Still, signalized intersections were overrepresented



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School-related crashes

- 63%: crashes involving younger victims within ¼ mile of a school
- 38%: Alameda streets within a ¼ mile of a school.



What is the City doing for street safety now?

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Vision Zero Implementation Team

- Internal coordination
- Post-collision site visits
- Prioritize street safety investments
- Updated street design policies




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29 new high visibility crosswalks so far in 2021
